FATAL EXPLOSION

On Board the Steamship St. Paul at New York.

NO PASSENGERS WERE ON BOARD

Or the Loss of Life Would Have Been

Frightful-Preparations Being Made for Sailing, Which will be Delayed a Week. Theories as to the Cause of the Accident. NEW YORK, Dec. 18.-An explosion

occurred this morning on the American line steamship St. Paul while the vessel was at her dock at the foot of Fulton been taken to the hospital and five men are said to have been killed.
Preparations were being made for the

sailing of the vessel at 11 o'clock, but fortunately none of the passengers were aboard of the vessel. The explosion was of terrific force and shook the big vessel from stem to stern. Following

steam. It poured up to the deck from the engine room in cleads and completely enveloped the vicinity.

From above the noise of the escaping steam could be heard the cries of the men who had been at work in the engine room injured by the explosion.

The nature of the explosion was such that it rendered access to the locality extremely difficult. As quickly as possible the steam was turned off. Almost simultarisectely four half dead men scrambled up the iron stairway leading from the engine room, and fell prostrate upon the port side of the vessel. They were hurried into the cabin and restoratives administered to them. Two other men terribly scalded were found in an almost unconscious condition lying near the bottom of the stairway and were lifted up to the dock.

As soon as the steam had cleared away sufficiently to render seeing the surroundings possible five men were foundlying near in various parts of the compartments dead. They had all been scalded to death and their faces and those parts of the body which were not covered by their clothing looked as it they had been parboiled.

The bodies were covered over where they were found lying with pieces of tarpaulin, and word was sent to the coroner's office.

The sreatest excitement prevalled aboard of the vessel for a time and it was thought that the boiler had blown up. The force of the explosion was so great that it blew out a portion of the bulkhead and shatered every particle of glass within a radius of fitty feet.

On investigation it was found that the main steam pipe at the bend near the bulkhead had burst. The pipe is sixteen inches in diameter and extends from one end of the ship to the other.

It was said by Superintending Engineer Clark that he did not know exactly what the amount of the pressure at the time to tell just what caused the explosion, whether there was not sufficient to cause the pipe to burst.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 18.—Replying to a telegraphic message from the United States Minister Terrell, missionaries at Marsovan telegraphed yesterday that they were all safe and guarded by troops.

The writer says that the Turks swarmed through the streets and into the houses, stoning, clubbing and killing every Armenlan within reach. The American mission, however, was not harmed, evidently owing to orders issued by the Turkish officials. But, the missionary continues, the Larbarity practiced passes all description. Men and women were litterally hacked to pleces, and a thousand persons were killed on the afternoon of November 30. The missionary also says that the government gave them permission to pillage. The boys of the American school are all safe, the letter concludes, and 109 fugitives are being sheltered in the missionaries depends upon the presence of the troops who are guarding them.

C., Dec. 17.—The inter-state commerce commission to-day in an opinion by Commissioner Clements announced its decision in the case of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company aginst the Southern Pacific Company and other carriers, relating to the legality of rates on steel rails and other from and steel articles from Pueblo, Colorado, to San Francisco.
The commission held that the rates complained of were unreasonable and unjust and oredered that the rates from Pueblo to San Francisco should not exceed forty-five cents per hundred pounds on steel rails and railway fast-enings and 37½ cents per hundred pounds on smaller articles of iron and rates should never exceed seventy-five per cent of those charged on like traffic from Chicago to San Francisco.
