WORLD OF SPORT.

The Trenton Ball Team to be Turned Over to Wheeling.

MORELAND HERE YESTERDAY

And Says the Prospects for the League Are First Class--His Plans for Wheeling in the Event that Buckenberger Gets the Franchise--Last Night's Bowling Games. Races at New Orleans--Wrestling at Slatersville--Other News of Sport.

Yesterday morning the Intelligencer exclusively mentioned the statement then unconfirmed that now that Buckenberger had secured the Toronto franchise in the Eastern league, he would hand over to Wheeling the players, originally intended for this city, that had been signed for Trenton. Yesterday afternoon, Mr. George L. Moreland, of Pittsburgh, who will manage Wheeling in the event that Buckenberger secures the Wheeling franchise in the Inter-state league, was in the city and confirmed this statement.

Mr. Moreland says that the prospects for the league are bright. He figures out that the circuit will include Wheeling, New Castle, Washington, and Youngstown in the east, and Toledo, Dayton, Akron and Fort Wayne in the west. This is a much better league than has been organized in this section in many years and should it be formed by responsible people it is sure to be a success. Every club mentioned is sure to be at the Toledo meeting ready to talk business with the possible exceptions of Akron and Dayton. At Akron, the franchise will be taken by Charlie Hazen, the well known ball player, and Gunnels writes that he has a good man to take hold at Dayton, which should be one of the best towns in the circuit.

As mentioned Moreland confirms the statement that Luck will turn over to Wheeling the players whom he signed for his Atlantic association team that was to represent Trenton. These players include the following, who are already slated to positions on the Wheeling team: Ryan, of Cincinnati, first base. He was recommended highly by Stenzel, of the Pittsburghs. John Wagner, of last year's Warrens, second base. One of the best fielding second basemen in the business. Al Wagner, of the Warren team last year, third base. His brilliant work both in the field and at the bat here last season made him a general favorite. Whally, of last year's Celoron team, short-stop. An aggressive player who will be a favorite. Edwards, late of the Pennsylvania league, left field. Moreland considers him a promising player. Atherton, an Eastern league man, right field. Rickert, late of Warren, or Shroeder, late of Canton, center field. Peter Lavelle, of last season's Scrubenville and Akron teams, catcher. One of the best back-stops in a minor league; a good man to coach a young and inexperienced pitcher.

Northwang, a well known Pittsburgh amateur, catcher. The pitchers will be Wright, late of Twin Cities, and McGraver, Baker and possibly Barrett, late of Warren. Billy Gray, late of Steubenville, and Titusville, and Conover, are also on Moreland's list.

An effort was made last night to learn of the intentions of the gentleman who has been locking over the ground with the idea of applying for the Wheeling franchise in the Inter-state league, but he could not be seen and for this reason his intentions are not known. It was said last evening that Mr. Schmulbach has finally determined to rebuild the base ball park at the upper end of the Island, insuring a club here for the coming season.

Moreland says that he will be here again in March to get things in shape for the opening of the season. The team is to report April 15, and will play a week with the Toronto team on the local grounds. Games are also to be arranged with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh early in the season. The other big league clubs will also be brought here. All this, of course, providing Buckenberger gets the franchise, which now seems probable.

TEN CITIES ARE APPLICANTS

For Membership in the Inter-State League Eight Club Circuit a Certainty. Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer. TOLEDO, O., Jan. 29.—The following towns are applicants for franchises in the Inter-state league: Toledo, Dayton, Lima, Youngstown, Akron, Fort Wayne, Wheeling, New Castle, Washington and Erie. One or two are a little doubtful. The meeting on the fourth will not be enough to make a good eighth club circuit. I have written to parties in Erie.

The following call for a meeting to form the Inter-state Base Ball League has been issued: A meeting will be held at Hotel Madison, Toledo, Ohio, Tuesday, February 5, 1896, to organize an Inter-State League for 1896. The meeting will be called in parlor No. 45, at 1:30 o'clock p. m. Hotel Madison is located at the corner of Madison and Ontario streets. If your city wishes to be in the league it should be represented. The league will be composed of good base ball clubs, and will be managed so as to make money for investors and be a credit to the community.

BELLAIRE.

All Sorts of Local News and Gossip from the Glass City. George M. Wise has given to the public a statement of the bonded indebtedness of the county and some other matters calculated to excite a greater interest in county affairs than has been manifested. He shows a deficiency in the county fund of \$10,000 to \$12,000 for each of the past three years. That is, the expenditures have exceeded the receipts in these three years more than \$32,000, while in the same time the tax duplicate has decreased about \$4,000,000. Mr. Wise is of the opinion that an increase in the tax levy is inevitable, and he makes this point all the stronger by the statement that should the Haskell-Harris bill pass the legislature and the liquor tax be wiped out that the county tax would necessarily have to be increased 3 cents, while in Bellaire it would have to be increased from 29 to 35 cents to provide even the funds that are now raised, leaving out the question of deficiency entirely.

Trains on the Bellaire, Zanesville & Cincinnati railroad have been instructed not to carry any passengers or freight from Lewisville, in Monroe county, while the smallpox lasts there. They have one case, a physician, and the trains don't even stop at that station by order of General Manager J. K. Geddes.

Mr. W. C. Stewart, who has been secretary of the Novelty Stamping Co., contemplates giving his name to the business of the Stewart Enameling Co. shortly. The Novelty will be conducted by the force still there.

The war on the price of telephones in this city will reach the climax Saturday, when about all of the subscribers here have agreed to abandon the use of the present 'phones unless the rental is reduced.

The electric machinery at the Bellaire steel works is now about all in position. They have 20-horse power electrical apparatus there in the new department, and everything works like a charm.

The effort to raise money for the completion of the Catholic church and school building is meeting with success and it is announced that it will be completed this spring.

Miss Florence Workman has quit her place with Mrs. J. R. Hartshorn in this city to accept a place as saleslady in Geo. E. Stifel & Co's store in Wheeling.

John W. Duncan and J. W. Morrill were both announced as Republican candidates for mayor yesterday, and each expects to be the winner.
