THE NEW LIGHT

In Photography Discovered by Prof. Roentgen, of Germany, IS EXPERIMENTED WITH HERE.

Mr. William Myles, the South Side Photographer, Obtains Some Slight Results with a Geeler Tube—His Experiments, Although Made with Comparatively Crude Instruments, Show that there are Marvelous Possibilities Ahead with the New Energy.

The interest which has been manifested in scientific circles all over the world in the discovery of Prof. Roentgen of the so-called cathode photography, or a new light which penetrates opaque substances, has induced amateurs as well as experts to try their hand in obtaining results similar to those said to have been achieved by the German professor. Such being the case, it is no wonder that some one in Wheeling should try his hand at it. For the past few days the well known photographer, Mr. William Myles, has been quietly conducting experiments at his studio, South Main street, more for his own satisfaction than any thing else, and the results that have attended his investigation, meager as they are, have shown conclusively, that with a more perfect apparatus, all that has been accomplished elsewhere could have been duplicated by him.

The manner of procedure is quite interesting, and an Intelligencer reporter was entertained the other afternoon by Mr. Myles, who was experimenting with the light. Although other experimenters used what is called a Crook's tube, Mr. Myles utilized a Geeler tube, which is virtually the same thing, the only difference being that the latter is a spiral glass tube with bulbs at each end, while the Crook's tube is perfectly plain. The principal of both are the same, mainly to obtain, as nearly as possible, a vacuum. To make these experiments the tube is connected with a small copper wire to a battery and when this wire is charged with a strong electric current, connecting the two ends of the vacuum, one known as the anode or negative and the other as the cathode or positive, the effect of the current in the extremely rarified air in the tube is to produce the most powerful rays known to physicists.

When the current is turned on, the interior of the tube becomes luminous. There is a violet color, varying in shades with the strength of the electrical current. At times the two ends of the tube show a greenish tinge, while at others the whole interior is violet.

The rays, however, that produce the wonderful results, do not come from the visible illumination. Prof. Roentgen calls them X rays for want of any other name. They cannot be seen. They are mysterious and unknown, except that they are proven to exist.

Mr. Myles labored under the disadvantage of a weak battery when he was making his experiments. He placed the bulb of the tube on the top of the photographic slide, and underneath the slide was the sensitized plate. After an exposure for a considerable time, it was found that a straight dark line, about a quarter of an inch in width, was impressed on the plate. There was light went through it and the ebontite slide. Of course the result was quite small, but Mr. Myles said that with a stronger battery and the proper materials, he could duplicate what others have done in their experiments.
