# OH, THE WEATHER!

### A Spell of Genuine Old-Fashioned Winter that Lasts

### IS A RARITY IN THIS CLIMATE.

Several inches of Snow Fell Yesterday Morning and a Good Little Bit Again in the Evening—A Few Sleights Out—Formal Warning to Clean the Sidewalks Served by the Board of Public Works.

Yesterday morning a very good installment of "old-fashioned winter" struck this part of the Ohio Valley, just when people were congratulating themselves that the winter was going to pass over with a continuous run of the kind of weather that men pay money to go to Florida and enjoy. It has really been a marvelous winter, mild and as unlike the "winters that use to be" as weather could easily be. The few snows have been far apart, and when the one yesterday morning arrived people were astonished. It has been many a day since there has been a snow that sleighs could come out in, but yesterday a few were out in the forenoon, and in the afternoon there were a great many out. The snow was a little slushy. The city board of public works gives formal notice in another column of this morning's paper that the law requiring the sidewalks to be cleared of snow and ice will be rigidly enforced. The cold weather, as usual, is accompanied by a shortage of gas, and yesterday very many families had difficulty in cooking their meals, or even keeping warm in the house.

### THE NEW CHARTER.

#### The Committee Simply Reports that it Thinks One Necessary.

Saturday evening the special committee of council and citizens on a new charter held its second meeting. There was a great deal of discussion, but little was done. Mr. A. R. Campbell offered the following:

"Resolved, That council be informed that it is the sense of the special committee appointed under this resolution to take into consideration the subject of a new charter; that it is the sense of this committee that a new charter is necessary, and asks for further instructions."

There was objection to the last clause because it was "bidding for a job." After some little talk, Mr. Campbell withdrew his motion, and Mr. Waterhouse offered the following:

"To His Honor the Mayor and Council of the City of Wheeling:

"Gentlemen:—The committee to which was referred the following resolution:

"Resolved, That a special committee of eight members, four from the first and four from the second branch, who shall confer with a like committee of citizens, to be chosen as follows: Two from the Chamber of Commerce, two from the Trades Assembly, two from the Builders' Exchange and two to be selected outside of these organizations, to be appointed by the mayor—for the purpose of taking into consideration the expediency of framing a new charter for the city, their action to be reported back to council at the earliest time possible. The committee is to be non-partisan."

"Respectfully report that they are of the opinion the city needs a new charter."

This was unanimously adopted and the committee adjourned.

### A SAD ACCIDENT.

#### Clyde Parker, a Boy of Five Years, Falls Down an Elevator Shaft.

Just after 12 o'clock Saturday a very sad accident happened at the Rogers block, on Main street, by which Clyde Parker, the five-year-old son of Prof. Frank Parker, the dancing teacher, lost his life. The family lives in the block, on the third floor. Prof. Parker was called out by a visitor and the little boy followed him. In some way he got the door of the elevator open and fell down the shaft, crushing his skull and killing him instantly. He was soon missed, but was not found until after a long search through the houses in the vicinity.



