CAPT. DANFORD'S CANVASS

Not Hurt by a Spurious Letter Published in His District.

An attempt was made to create something of a commotion in the congressional district over the river by republishing a paragraph from a letter probably written by Captain Danford while in Congress eighteen years ago. The old letter was furnished by a disappointed Belmont county man to the Steubenville Gazette but Captain Danford soon put the matter to rest by saying: "I have written no letter declining renomination, or authorized such letter or said anything looking that way." If letter printed is genuine it was written eighteen years ago. It not then it is spurious. The letter was ridiculed by Republicans when it first appeared because it bore the earmarks of fraud in not having any date to it and being in the hands of enemies instead of friends. That it had no effect is seen in the voice of the press in every county in the district. The Cadiz Republican says: "We see that it is the understanding, expressed by nearly all the Republican papers of the district, that Captain Danford will have no opposition for a renomination at the coming congressional convention."

The Steubenville Herald says Capt. Danford will be renominated without opposition. The Carroll Free Press says: Capt. Danford's renomination is conceded by all the counties in the district. The Monroe Gazette says: "The renomination of Capt. Danford is conceded throughout the district."

WITH THE RAILROADS.

On the Proposed Loan Depends the Baltimore & Ohio's Branch Company.

The proposition to form the Baltimore & Ohio Northwestern Railroad Company has been deferred until an expert accountant completes an examination of the affairs of the Baltimore & Ohio company. Largely on the result of his investigation will depend the amount of the loan to be made to the Baltimore & Ohio company by a syndicate of New York capitalists, and, incidentally, the question of forming the auxiliary system.

The new company will embrace the Pittsburgh & Western railroad and the branch built by the Baltimore & Ohio company from Akron to Chicago Junction. Should this company be made a separate organization Mr. Thomas M. King, second vice president of the Baltimore & Ohio, will, it is understood, be selected as its chief executive officer, though no intimation has been made that he will sever his connection with the Baltimore & Ohio company.

The purchase of the Pittsburgh & Western road and the construction of the connecting link from Akron to Chicago Junction were, it is stated, recommended by Mr. King.

Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling for six months, ending December 31, earned gross, \$887,227; increase, \$104,971; net, \$282,998; increase, \$11,030.

Two parties of railroad officials were in Wheeling yesterday on tour of inspection. The officials' car of the Wheeling & Lake Erie with President and General Manager Blair and other officials on board, was here Thursday evening. The road was inspected from Valley Junction to Wheeling. From here the officials went up the Steubenville branch of the road. The private car "Patapasco" of the Baltimore & Ohio with General Superintendent Fitzgerald, Division Superintendent R. M. Sheets, Superintendent of Motive Power Cromwell, and others, arrived from the east in the morning, and part of the day was spent in an inspection of the shops at McMechen.
