## WORK STARTED.

The Pipe Line to the Cameron Gasser is Being Laid.

## THIRTY LABORERS WILL START

The Work of Laying the Pipe at the Cameron End of the Line—To be Completed Within Six Weeks—Oil News From Sistersville and Other Southwest Field Points—The Kanawha Company's Strike in Wetzel County.

Work on the pipe line that is to bring to Wheeling manufacturers the product of the great gasser recently struck by the Wheeling Natural Gas Company half a mile from Cameron, in Marshall county, is to be started this morning. The company has experienced some difficulty in securing as many laborers as it desired, but to-day twenty-five or thirty men will start the work of laying the pipe. The first work is to be done at the Cameron end and proceeding on to the river front at Moundsville, via the county road. It was first thought desirable to run the line along the right of way of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, but later the company changed its plan as indicated. The mains will not be tapped until Moundsville is reached, where the various manufacturing establishments will be supplied. Coming up the river from Moundsville, McMechen and Benwood factories will be supplied with fuel from the big gasser, and in the latter place the Wheeling mains of the company are to be tapped. The company is also establishing in Bellair and the other over-the-river towns with gas. With all this consumption of gas the output of the new well will not be disposed of. The pipe line will be completed within six weeks.

## MADE ANOTHER FLOW.

The Wetzel County Well of the Kanawha Company—Other Operations.

The Kanawha Oil Company's well on Seese run, near Pine Grove, Wetzel county, made another small flow on Sunday, making the second since it was drilled into the sand. The work of erecting tankage is being rapidly pushed, and as soon as completed the drill will be sent deeper into the rock.

A record of nearest operations to this new strike will not be amiss at this time. To the northeast one and a half miles from the Philadelphia Company has a strong gasser on the Robinson farm. The vaporous fluid was found in the Big Injun. A half mile still further to the northeast the same company has a fair gasser on the Laycock farm, and one and a half miles in advance on the same range the South Penn Oil Company drilled a small Big Injun gasser on the W. D. Cox farm. Subsequently this well was drilled to the lower Gordon sand, and developed an enormous gas pressure, which was later piped to Braden pumping station, six miles distant, and furnished fuel for the plant for some years. To the southwest some four or five miles on a 45-degree line lies the Indian creek country, made famous by the Big Moses gasser and the Kyle and Weekly gushers. It can readily be seen that nothing has been developed in the past to condemn the Mills tract, while the accepted theory of the northeast and southwest belt brings it within the line of possibilities as a new pool.

## THE OGDEN WELL

At Waverly Has Been Shot and is Now Producing Nearly 100 Barrels. Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer.

SISTERSVILLE, W. Va., March 3.—A gentleman arrived here from Waverly on this afternoon's train and reports that the Brier & Alford's well, on the Ogdan farm, located about three miles south of Waverly, was shot in the Berea grit sand this morning and is now making between ninety and one hundred barrels a day. This well coming in good makes the narrow strip of undeveloped land lying between the gas wells that have been drilled to the northwest, and the small wells located south of the Ogdan farm, look very good, and would indicate that there is a good pool in that section.

## What Two Boys Did.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., March 3.—Several years ago Ludwig & Mooney drilled a well on the S. S. Stone farm, three miles above this city, through the Berea grit. They got some oil, but for some cause pulled the casing and abandoned the well which has stood full of oil ever since. Several weeks ago two boys named Grier and Cook got permission to have all the oil they could get out of the well. They rigged up an old fashioned hand pump and have been getting an average of three and one-half barrels per day out of the hole. There is now talk of putting down another well in this vicinity.




