THE SPANISH PRESS. Very Bitter Against Congress for Passing Cuban Resolutions. NEW YORK, April 8.—A dispatch to the World from Madrid, says:

All the papers hotly condemn the American Congress for the belligerency resolutions, which they persist in considering an act of hostility and an insult to the Spanish people.
