

A PACKET QUITS.

The Evansville Sold and Goes to the Green River Trade.

ANOTHER BOAT FOR NEWPORT

Trade is to be Secured Next Week, Says Captain Goodwin—The Fast Trip up the River of the Virginia—The Best Time Made in Years—Captain Bruce's Scheme for a Fast Passenger Packet—Jewel to Make Sunday Trips.

The packet Evansville, which was chartered two months ago by Captain William Goodwin, formerly of the Lexington, to run in the Wheeling and Newport trade, has made her last trip in local trades. Her owner, Captain John F. Klein, of Pittsburgh, has sold her to Captain Veach, of Evansville, Ind., who will start her down the river this morning. When the Evansville came in from below last evening at 7 o'clock she was turned over to her owner. Captain Veach made an effort to secure a cargo of Wheeling nails for St. Louis, but as the rate was so low on the packet lines he did not get anything. Captain Goodwin says he will have another packet here next week to take the place of the Evansville in the Newport trade. Had it not been for sickness, he says, he would have had a boat ready to jump right into this trade this morning. He has several boats in view as successor of the Evansville.

The Sunday excursion feature recently inaugurated by the Evansville has become quite popular, many people of the city taking the Sunday ride on the beautiful Ohio, together with a brief stay in the oil metropolis, Sistersville. Yesterday afternoon Captain Thad. Thomas, of the Clarington packet, Jewel, announced that hereafter his boat will make Sunday trips from Wheeling to Sistersville and return, leaving Wheeling at 7 a. m. and returning at 7 p. m. She will make her first trip next Sunday. If Captain Goodwin secures a new boat for the Newport trade, he will no doubt resume the Sunday trip to Sistersville. Then the local excursion trade will be lively.

Captain Ed. Bruce, of Moundsville, has a great scheme. He proposes to build a side-wheel passenger packet of greater speed than anything seen on western waters, of very light draft, and place her in the Wheeling and Pittsburgh trade. Nothing but passengers and express matter will be carried. The boat will leave Wheeling at 5 o'clock every other afternoon and arrive at Pittsburgh early in the morning. As the trip is made in the night, traveling men and others who do not wish to put in the day in traveling between the two cities will patronize the boat. The larger traffic, however, is to come from the Wheeling and Steubenville shoppers who go to Pittsburgh in such large numbers. As the boat is to arrive at the Smoky City early in the morning, they will have the entire day for shopping, and can leave for home in the evening, arriving the next morning. Mr. Bruce says there are several big retail houses in Pittsburgh and Allegheny that stand ready to assist in placing the new boat in operation, but what is bothering him just now is the opposition of Wheeling business houses, that object to anything that tends to take trade away from this city. Unless the Wheeling merchants can be conciliated, says Mr. Bruce, the boat will probably not be built.

The Virginia is making a remarkably fast trip up the river to Pittsburgh. Yesterday morning Captain Crookard, of the wharboat, received a telegram from Captain Calhoun, stating that the new packet had passed Middleport at 10 p. m. Wednesday, and that she would be here at 11 o'clock last night. The captain somewhat overestimated the capacity of the boat in doing the stretch of river between Parkersburg and Wheeling, however, as she did not reach the Belmont coal works until 1 o'clock this morning. She was at the public landing here at 2 o'clock, and got away for Pittsburgh at 2:30 this morning. Even if she did not arrive here at 11 o'clock, it is a good performance, and shows that the Virginia is the speediest boat on the Ohio.
