Woman's Missionary Society of Washington Presbytery

HOLDS ITS ANNUAL MEETING

Here—The Attendance was Larger than Ever Before in the History of the Society—Interesting Reports Submitted by the Officers—A Fine Address by Rev. Mr. Speer Last Night—Old Officers Re-elected for the ensuing Term.

The thirteenth annual meeting of the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Presbytery of Washington, was held in the Second Presbyterian church this city, yesterday, and was more largely attended than any in the history of the society. The church was tastefully decorated with flowers and a large map of the United States, the field of Home Missions, was displayed prominently. The meeting opened at half-past ten o'clock, with devotional exercises, led by the president, Mrs. F. Bell, of Washington, Pa., after which the secretary, Mrs. Lapsley, also of Washington, read the minutes. The following programme was then carried through:

making a trade of murder, employed a private investigator, and had the skeletons of his victims mounted, and then sold for cash. He neglected no opportunity.

The murder of Emily Cigrand comes next in interest. She came from Lafayette, Ind. She was a blonde, and the prettiest of Holmes' victims. When nineteen years old she was employed as a stenographer by Dr. Keely, the gold-cure man. Pitezel met her when he was in the institution, and when he got out he told Holmes. Holmes wrote to the girl, offering a larger salary than she was then getting, and she came to the castle. It is believed that Holmes forced her to maintain illicit relations with him, and that, finding that she was learning too much of his affairs, he killed her.

Other Murders.

The alleged murder of Mrs. Julia Conner and her daughter, Pearl Conner, aged eight years, occurred in the castle next. The Conners went from Dayton, Ohio, to Chicago about 1890. Holmes was then running a drug and jewelry store at the corner of Wallace and Sixty-third streets. Conner got a job working in the jewelry department of Holmes' store. Holmes saw his wife, who was a very pretty woman, and offered to give her a place as bookkeeper. She accepted it. Holmes made love to her, but Conner did not suspect anything. The affair went on for some time, and Conner heard of it indirectly through Holmes himself. Conner consulted his friends and separated from his wife, leaving her with Holmes. She kept the child. Mrs. Conner was a woman of brains, and just the kind that Holmes would pick out to help him along in his schemes. She was last seen alive, still in Holmes' employ, about September, 1892. Then she disappeared like the rest of them. Her murderer, if she was murdered, is supposed to have been one of the first that Holmes committed.

Emily Van Tassel was the name of a girl who worked for Holmes in the castle, and who like the others suddenly disappeared. Very little is known of her story. Perhaps she, too, fell a victim to his lust for blood.
One thing may be said of Holmes in passing. To the women he married he was always a model of virtue. He dispensed his money with a liberal hand, and was invariably kind and gentle to them.
Many imaginative theories have been advanced regarding this marvelous pervert, and whispers of "hypnotism," and "the evil eye" have been frequent. Without considering these, it is a strange fact that a sinister fate has befallen many of those connected with his case. William A. Spoonmaker, one of his lawyers, attempted to foist upon the court a bogus affidavit, and was subjected to disgrace, and finally disbarred for a period. Then Dr. William K. Mattern, the coroner's physician, who made an autopsy on Pitezel's body, suddenly dropped dead recently; and lastly, Linford T. Bliss, who was foreman of the jury in the trial, was a few weeks ago shocked to death by a live wire. Altogether it is safe to assume that a sigh of relief will go up from the whole country with the knowledge that Herman Mudgett, or Henry H. Holmes, man or monster, has been exterminated—much the same as a plague to humanity would be stamped out. But the true story of his strange career will probably never be known.

A Suit in Circuit Court Lost by House & Herrmann.

Yesterday in Judge Campbell's side of the circuit court, the day was occupied in the hearing of the case of House & Herrmann vs. Laura Farnsworth, of this city. The plaintiffs allege that the defendant refused to pay for goods which she had purchased on installments. The defendant claimed that she had paid the claim on which the firm sued, and produced receipts in support. The plaintiff replied by showing that the receipts shown were for another purchase of goods made by Miss Farnsworth. The jury brought in a verdict against the firm. An appeal to the supreme court of appeals is to be made.


