THE UNANIMITY

With Which the People Favor the Saturday Half-Holiday.

INSURANCE OFFICES FOLLOW

In the Wake of the Wholesale Establishments, and will Close at 1 p. m. Saturday During the Heated Term—Banks and Offices of Manufacturing Establishments May Join in the Project—Freight Agents to Hold a Special Meeting.

The news of the passage of the Saturday half-holiday resolution by the Wheeling chamber of commerce, was received with pleasure in the Main street business district yesterday. The general opinion is that the summer Saturday half-holiday movement will soon be extended beyond the wholesale business establishments, and take in the banks, and many offices. Already, as detailed below, the insurance offices have fallen in line and will hereafter close at 1 p. m. on Saturday.

An Intelligence reporter talked with the employes of houses that will be affected by the closing at 1 p. m., and found all enthusiastic for the half-holiday of recreation. One said: "It is nothing more than we are entitled to, but since from that no employer will lose a cent by granting the privilege. We will work twice as hard Saturday morning, urged on by the anticipation of an afternoon for recreation."

The action of the chamber of commerce in endorsing the half-holiday project and requesting the Freight Agents Association to close the freight stations at 1 p. m. on Saturday, during June, July and August, has been communicated to the officials of the association. The freight agents will hold a special meeting this week and formally order the stations to close at the hour mentioned.

The insurance companies of Wheeling are bound not to be outdone by the wholesale merchants in the matter of closing their offices on Saturday afternoons during the heated term. For several years it has been the custom of the insurance men to close their offices at 1 o'clock every Saturday from May 1 to October 1 and they have been doing so this year as usual, but when the wholesale people decided to close at 1 o'clock, steps were at once taken to follow their example, and this morning a petition will be circulated among the secretary's of the different insurance companies for signatures, which, of course, will be given willingly.

The Saturday half holiday has been started in Wheeling at last, and it is not too much to predict that before the summer is over fully two-thirds of the business houses in all branches will be closed at 1 o'clock. Other cities have inaugurated this system and it works successfully even among the retail establishments. The merchants lose nothing by closing, for if their patrons know that they cannot buy after 1 o'clock on

Saturday, they will go before that hour. The fact is demonstrated in the case of the grocers who close every evening except Friday and Saturday at 7 o'clock. They get their regular custom and have a few hours for recreation.

ST. CLAIRSVILLE PRESBYTERY.

At the Adjourned Meeting in Bridgeport a Minister was Installed.

The adjourned session of the St. Clairsville Presbytery held in the Presbyterian church at Bridgeport, was well attended, and a number of applicants were licensed to preach, and Dr. W. A. Williams, of Franklin College, was dismissed from the presbytery to accept a call at Moundsville, but retains the privilege of working within the bounds of St. Clairsville presbytery. Considerable business was transacted by the presbytery, and in the evening installation services were held in the church with Dr. J. S. Bogle as moderator, Rev. Dr. Plummer, of Cadiz, preached the sermon, Rev. Robert Alexander, of St. Clairsville, gave the charge to the pastor; Rev. H. A. L. King, of Bellaire, the charge to the people, Rev. W. L. Alexander, of Rock Hill, delivered the installation prayer, and Rev. J. A. Donahy was duly installed as pastor of the church at Bridgeport. Following these services the ladies of the congregation gave a reception to the new pastor and the members of the presbytery and others present, and a nice collation was served after a season of most enjoyable social mingling. There were a number from this city present at both the afternoon and evening services.






