A GREAT FIELD

Is the Gas Belt Brought to the Front Near Cameron BY THE WHEELING NATURAL GAS

Company—Local Manufacturers will Now Possess a Great Advantage Over Those of Other Communities—Bellaire's Board of Trade Awakening to this Fact—At Present there is Not Enough Consumption to Use the Supply in Sight.

The Intelligencer has already called attention to the importance of the great natural gas strike made by the Wheeling Natural Gas Company in Marshall county near Cameron. An official then said that the supply in sight was sufficient to assure the manufacturers of this community a bountiful supply of the gas fuel for at least ten years to come. This, it seems, was underestimating the truth.

It is now said that should there be a demand for more gas than the present ten-inch line from Cameron will supply, the company could build another pipe line of the same size, and though both would be in constant use, there is enough gas in sight in the new field to supply gas for both pipe lines for a decade. No other manufacturing community in the country can offer such advantages, and if the proper effort is made by Wheeling's commercial bodies they are sure to prove of great benefit to the town.

Already Bellaire's board of trade is awakened and is having prepared a pro-

spectus of the town, calling attention to the certain supply of natural gas for manufacturers. The Ohio town expects soon to inaugurate a boom. Many and possibly all of the glass manufacturers who went from this valley to Indiana when the gas excitement there was at its height, are expected to return to Bellaire, Wheeling and Martin's Ferry. Before the recent strike of gas by the Wheeling company, some of those same manufacturers were preparing to come back to the Ohio valley and coal in preference to Indiana and an uncertain and inadequate supply of gas.

Now, with assurances of gas fuel here for many years to come, manufacturing establishments from all over the central west should be attracted to the greater Wheeling. Wheeling's chamber of commerce will no doubt see these advantages and bring them to the attention of interested manufacturers. Certain it is that the great gas strike gives the Pan-Handle metropolis a push toward the goal of prosperity, and it will be her own fault if she doesn't take advantage of it.

The Wheeling Natural Gas Company is now furnishing the manufacturing establishments of Wheeling and all the neighboring towns with gas from the No. 1 (Howard) well near Cameron. The amount of gas used, however, is only a third of the natural output of the well.

The No. 2 (Barnett) well is still at large, an untamed monster that will require some coaxing before it is subdued. When it was drilled in last week, it was thought that it could be handled all right, as extra heavy casing had been provided. But when it was shut in the casing was split like so much sheet iron. An effort to cage the big 'un will probably be made this week. The third gasser of the same company, the Hicks, is drilling at about 1,500 feet, and will not reach the 'un for some time. The gas was struck in the other two wells at a depth of 2,900 feet.

The Natural Gas Company of West Virginia has brought in a nice gasser in Greene county, Pennsylvania, about six miles across-country from the Barnett and Howard wells of the Wheeling

company, and it looks as though the intervening territory is good for gas. It was said last evening that a Wheeling oil company had struck gas in the Jim's run field in Marshall county yesterday, but no confirmation of the report was obtained. The well was being drilled for oil.

TWO OIL STRIKES.

The Well on the Thompson Farm, Across from Moundsville, Comes In.

News was received here late last night that the well on the Thompson estate farm, in Belmont county, opposite Moundsville, had come in good for a producer of at least 500 barrels a day. According to the story received, which could not be confirmed, the well was spouting oil twenty-five feet over the top of the derrick. It was drilled by Murphy Brothers, the Pittsburgh operators.

Last evening a good strike was made on the Suppes farm, in Monroe county, Ohio, about five miles from the famous Dogskin district, in new territory. The production is said to be from 250 to 300 barrels daily. The well was put down by Edward Wagner, Harry Seybold and other Wheeling people. The rig was burned to the ground. Tanks are being erected.

SHE SOUGHT DEATH.

A Young Woman From Parkersburg Takes a Dose of Poison.

Yesterday shortly after noon, Maude Rogers, a young woman who lived on the top floor at 950 Market street, the lower floors of which are occupied as a house of ill fame, took a glass full of carbolic acid. Drs. Spragg and Ridgeway were called, but found that the young woman was dangerously near death. They did all possible for her, but it was thought early in the evening that the woman would succumb. At 1:30 a. m. Dr. Ridgeway was called in again, the sick woman having become rapidly worse.

Miss Rogers is said to be the daughter of a Parkersburg clergyman. It is further alleged that she has been disappointed in love and came to Wheeling for the purpose of suiciding.

THE WEST VIRGINIA Glass Works to Start to be Started Soon. The Terms Agreed On.

Yesterday the glassworkers agreed to work out \$5,000 in stock in the West Virginia Glass Works, in shares of \$100 each if the works are put in operation. The men who bought the plant when it was sold are willing to put it in at \$25,000, the price paid, and they, together with Mr. McGregor, the new general manager, will subscribe \$15,000. The citizens of Martin's Ferry have been asked to subscribe \$5,000 in stock, of which \$1,900 has been raised.
