Thousands of Ladies of Stark County Greet McKinley.

HIS WIFE AND AGED MOTHER.

The Magnificent Reception at the Residence of the Late Jacob Miller--Beautiful Floral Decorations and Electrical Effects--More Distinguished Visitors Arrive to Consult with the Future President--Charles Emory Smith, of Philadelphia, Among Them.

THE CLOUDBURST.

In Washington County, Ohio, had tremendous damage along the streams. PARKERSBURG, W. Va., June 25.--Some definite news is coming about the disastrous cloud-burst in the north-eastern part of Washington county, Ohio, which occurred on Wednesday night. The area of the great rainfall was comparatively small. Roads have been rendered impassable and have thus virtually cut off communication with the region affected. The fury of the flood was along the eastern tributaries of the Little Muskingum river.

At a place known as "Fifteen" a church, schoolhouse and some dwellings were washed away. "Slabtown" a place of twelve cottages was washed away and the cottages are now floating down the Ohio river. In the same region Evisler's flour mill, Kett's hat store and Heslop's postoffice were swept away and are now floating down the Ohio river.

On Archer's Ferry and in portions of part of Washington county, George Deutscher's flour mill, McCowan's general store and the dwellings of George Deutscher, Thomas Ludington, Jacob Smith and John Gordon were swept away.

In the neighborhood of Hill's post-office, three schoolhouses were carried away by the flood. If any lives have been lost the news has not yet reached here.

THE WELL KNOWN VARIETY ACTOR DIES AT HIS HOME IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, June 26.--John W. Kelley, the well known variety actor and song writer, died at his mother's home in this city this afternoon of acute gastritis. He was known as the "Rolling Millman" and was very popular on the vaudeville stage.

He was 45 years old. He made his first professional appearance in Chicago, where he "doubled" up with Lew Perkins. He first appeared here on October 10, 1892, at Tony Pastor's theatre, where he remained for a two year's engagement. Afterwards he traveled with Pastor's company. His last appearance in public was on June 14, when a benefit was given for William Kye at Park street church.

Fifteen popular comic songs were written by him at various intervals. The three best known are "Throw him Down, McCloskey," "Slide, Kelly, Slide," and "Come along, my little boy." Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made, but it will probably occur on Sunday.

Showing that the Present Money System is Not to Blame.

THE BATTLE FOR THE CONGRESS.

Campaign Committees Getting in Headlines--Tariff the Republic Cry--Statistics Showing the Wilson Bill Caused Recent and Present Troubles--An Interview with Chairman Babcock, of the National Congressional Committee--The Tremendous Falling Off in Revenues.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.--Representative Babcock, chairman of the Republican congressional committee, is again in the city, hard at work at the committee's headquarters. Mr. Babcock's committee will devote itself entirely to looking after doubtful congressional districts. Mr. Babcock feels very confident of the result in November. Talking to-day on the subject, he said:

"We will have no difficulty in electing a large majority of the members of the next house of representatives. And so far as the presidency is concerned there is not in my opinion the least doubt of the election of Mr. McKinley. The money question is the only serious question on the silver question, but all the Republican votes we lose will be more than made up by accessions from the men in the Democratic party in favor of sound money. The money question is a reshaping of political lines, but in my opinion the Republicans will profit by the changes that will take place.

"The tariff will be the issue of the campaign. We shall have to secure the support of some of our friends who have been deceived by the specious talk on silver, but as soon as the facts are fairly presented to them I have no doubt of the favorable result."

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IMPROVEMENT RETARDED.

By the Free Silver Agitation--R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade.

NEW YORK, June 25.--R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade, which issues to-morrow, will say: The monetary outlook is not yet clear to some. The strength shown in recent conventions by advocates of silver coinage, and expectation that all the elements favoring that policy may yet be concentrated, incline them to a waiting attitude. Their uncertainty retards improvement. Nevertheless, the more widely prevalent feeling that the monetary action of the St. Louis convention will be sustained by the people. But many mills have waited as long as they can with safety, and structures have been built on high enough cotton mills on Fall River to ensure a temporary stoppage. It is stated, the nature of which is now under discussion in conference with the Providence manufacturer.

Woolen mills are acting without concert, but fourteen are mentioned in dispatches as having closed this week. There is no similar movement in other industries, though the period of summer closing is at hand in many of them, and important controversies as to wages of iron puddlers and other hand make it likely that the annual stoppage in that industry may last longer than usual. The price of iron, which has declined 21 cents, and of cotton, which is an eighth lower for spots, though less for futures, have full explanation in decidedly poor crop prospects. The Iron Age will say, tend to cause disastrously low prices hereafter, still control the markets for material and finished products of iron and steel, though it is down to the price of iron, which is made for coke, owing to better utilization of by-products, and for nails, owing to the heavy decrease in consumption.

The steel pool reports no larger sale, but middlemen or outsiders continue to under-sell it. The new demand for finished products is very light, and while quotations average a shade lower, most of them are not so low as they were. The summer pig is a shade lower at \$12.25 at Pittsburgh. The textile manufacturers, as has been said, are generally devising curtailment of production, and the only change in prices is downward.

HARRISON COUNTY TEACHERS.

Law, the instructors being Professor T. C. Miller, of the state university, and Professor J. W. Barnes, principal of the Fairmont state normal. The musical feature, which continued for an hour, was under the direction of Professor T. Francis Kemper. There was an enrollment of 250 teachers, and the institute was a most successful one.
