Two men were arrested in Bellaire yesterday morning charged with robbing Henry Helriegel of \$152 at the boarding house of W. H. Snyder, in Benwood, on Sunday. The man lost his money and he is puzzled to understand how two entire strangers in the neighborhood would know anything about his having money.
