THE RAILROADS.

General Passenger agents of the railroads in the Central passenger committee will meet in Chicago to-day.

The object of the meeting as heretofore announced is to consider the proposed 5,000-mile interchangeable ticket for the territory of the Central passenger committee. If the suggestion of General Passenger Agent Ford, of the Pennsylvania line, the author of the ticket, is carried out, it will be made good over all the lines members of the committee. A protest will likely be made before the committee by the roads in the Central committee territory that are not members of the committee, to the adoption of any such rule. They claim that if a ticket of that kind is going to be adopted in this territory, all the roads, whether members of the committee or not, should be included in the agreement. It is very probable that the committee will decide to adopt the ticket, but whether roads in the territory not members of the committee will be included in the arrangement would be difficult to anticipate.

A New Mileage Ticket.

The roads of the Western Passenger Association are now considering a new form of mileage ticket which will, they think, meet all the requirements of the case. It is proposed to charge all purchasers of tickets three cents per mile at the time of the purchase of the ticket and when the ticket is used up the holder is to be granted a rebate of one cent per mile if the use of the ticket has been satisfactory to the roads.

BELMONT COUNTY MINERS

On the Baltimore & Ohio, West of Bellaire, Ont on Striker.

At Troll's two mines, Franklin and Neff's mines, along the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, west of Bellaire, closed down yesterday for the reason that the miners all went out on a strike against a reduction of from 61 to 45 cents. Over 200 men are out, and they will not go back until their demands have been granted.

BY ELEVEN VOTES

John Hess Defeats John H. Whyte For Commissionership.

WEBSTER RECOUNT FINISHED

Yesterday Afternoon at 2 O'Clock—Whyte was Given the Best of It at Every Turn, but the Hess Majority was Increased.

The Figures by Precincts—An Interesting Phase of the Recount Shown in the Vote for Richards and Irwin.

Yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock the board of county commissioners completed the recount of the votes in Webster district for county commissioner. The Democratic candidate, John H. Whyte had applied for the recount, believing that the slim majority of six which John Hess, his Republican opponent, had, could be more than wiped out. Quite the contrary was the truth, for the recount advanced Hess' majority to the eleven mark.

When the board adjourned on Tuesday afternoon, five of the eight precincts had been recounted, so that only the sixth, seventh and eighth precincts remained to be counted yesterday. The sixth precinct showed a loss of one for Hess and two for Whyte, a net gain for Hess of one vote. In the seventh precinct there was no change in Hess' vote, but Whyte's was cut down one. In the eighth precinct, too, Whyte's vote was cut down three. In no case were ballots thrown out, all the cuts in Whyte's vote being mistakes of the election officers making the returns. The commissioners acted unanimously on every point brought up. A number of votes were cast for "White," but all of these were counted for Whyte, although the board, acting in strict accordance with the law governing elections, could have thrown out all such ballots.

A peculiar phase of the recount in Webster district is brought out in connection with the vote for sheriff. It has been claimed by some that Sheriff-elect Richards would have been defeated for the Democratic support that he received. A gentleman kept tally on the number of scratched ballots in one of the heaviest voting precincts in Webster, yesterday afternoon, and found that while twenty-two Republican voters for Irwin, the Democratic candidate, only two Democrats scratched their ballots in favor of Richards.
