Joseph J. Hazen will probably play right end. His great strength is his power and his endurance.

Clarence M. Pinckney is far and away the best all round man playing his position this year.

H. C. Brokaw, left end, as a substitute on last season's team, showed good form and has done excellent work thus far this year.

F. L. Smith has been a substitute on the regular 'Varsity team during the past two years.

Smith played in the Princeton-Pennsylvania game of 1894, and will be found at the quarter-back position against Yale, barring accident.

W. H. Bannard, of Long Branch, N. J., is Princeton's star half-back of the present season. Indeed he is one of the best men playing the position to-day and can always be depended upon to make a good gain when the ball is passed to him for a run around the end or a plunge through the line.

John Baird, far and away the best full back of this season on any team, will fill that position for Princeton in this contest. He is a sure kicker and seldom fails to place the leather just where he pleases.

Record in Former Years. During a series of thirteen years, the respective football teams of Yale and Princeton Universities have met to contest for victory on the 'gridiron' field.

During the present season the work of the New Jersey college has been superior to that of Yale. It is conceded by all who have watched the development of the two coaches that the Tigers are particularly strong behind the line, and that she also has such good material in the line that Yale will have her hands full from the very beginning of the contest.


