With the Affix "Merry" for Jess Houghton's Family.

INSTANTLY KILLED LAST NIGHT

In a Wreck on the Wheeling & Lake Erie Above Wheeling.

WAS IN CHARGE OF AN ENGINE

Running Light From Massillon to Warrenton, when Half a Mile West of the Latter Place the Machine Left the Rails and Went Over the Embankment to the County Road, Twenty Feet Below—Fireman Haynes Perhaps Fatally Injured. A Report was Current that a Passenger Train Had Been Wrecked.

An engine on the Wheeling & Lake Erie railroad jumped the track a half mile west of Warrenton yesterday afternoon, killing the engineer and injuring the fireman. The engine ran on the ties a hundred yards after leaving the rails and then went over an embankment to the county road, twenty feet below. Both the engineer and fireman live at Massillon.

The engine was No. 81 and was a big freight locomotive on its way from Massillon to Warrenton. It was in charge of Jess Houghton, engineer, and Ellsworth Haynes, fireman, and no other railroad men were on board. The engine was "light" and running about fourteen miles an hour, and jumped the track while running around a short curve a half mile west of Warrenton. Leaving the rails the engine ran on the ties one hundred yards, tearing up the track, and then shot down over the embankment to the county road, where it lodged on one side. The engine was badly wrecked. Jess Houghton, the unfortunate engineer, was killed instantly. His body was terribly mangled and burned, and it is said that there was not an unbroken bone left in his body. He was a married man and resided at Massillon. He was about thirty-five years old and expected to spend Christmas with his wife.

Ellsworth Haynes, the fireman, is still living. His face was frightfully burned and all his hair and mustache burned off. He was seriously bruised about the body and complained particularly about his back. He was not Houghton's regular fireman, who was off for Christmas and in the best of spirits when seen at Massillon yesterday. Haynes was also a married man. He was placed on passenger train No. 8 last evening and taken to Massillon. Houghton's body was sent to Massillon on the same train.

Just what caused the engine to leave the track is not known. The rails on the lower side of the track, which were torn up, were found near the rails on the opposite side for a distance of forty yards, almost touching at one place. The regular evening passenger trains were delayed two hours by the accident. It was first reported that the evening passenger train, due in Wheeling at 6:10 p. m. from Toledo, had been wrecked.

MR. T. J. GERAGHTY DEAD.

Death of a Well Known Former Wheelingite in Denver.

The many friends of Mr. Thomas J. Geraghty, formerly of Wheeling, will regret to learn that he died yesterday at his home in Denver, Colorado. Mr. Geraghty located in Wheeling about six years ago, as agent for the Union News Company, but in 1894 he was compelled to move to Colorado, on account of lung trouble. Consumption, however, had made such inroads in his system that the change was too late. Mr. Geraghty was a mine broker, and had built up a good business. He was thirty-two years of age and leaves a wife and one small child.
