TOWN ELECTIONS

Held in the Communities East of the City Yesterday.

POLITICS DID NOT FIGURE IN IT.

Except that in Elm Grove the Democrats tried an Underhanded Scheme That Failed of Success—Mayor Hamm, of Fulton, Defeated—Triadelphia Election. Pleasant Valley Election—The Results in Detail.

The municipal elections of the communities east of the city, in the Wheeling creek valley, were held yesterday. Politics did not figure in the contests with the exception of that at Elm Grove, where the Democrats tried a scheme that was a flat failure. Without openly putting a partisan effort to gain control of the town government. The man who was voted on for mayor by the Democrats disclaims any knowledge of the scheme. The results:

Elm Grove Election.

The election at Elm Grove was rather quiet, though a ripple of excitement was created by a Democratic ruse. Heretofore politics did not enter into the suggestions for council, and the ticket made out for yesterday's election contained the names of both Democrats and Republicans. But a day or so before the election a few partisans prepared a straight Democratic ticket, and though there was no opposition to Mr. J. M. Butler, for mayor, they placed the name of Mr. J. G. Robb. This was done, however, without his consent and he disclaimed any connection with the transaction.

These tickets were distributed around among those of the Democratic faith, but many of the brethren refused to take part in the scheme.

In support of the statement that politics do not cut much of a figure in Elm Grove municipal elections, it is necessary only to note that Samuel C. Patterson, Democrat, received most of the votes in the run for council. The vote was as follows:

- Mayor—J. M. Butler (R.), 67; J. G. Robb (D.), 29.
- Recorder—George W. Hand (R.), 62; W. R. Chambers (D.), 32.
- Council—John Kiger (R.), 68; S. C. Patterson (D.), 71; Lester Smith (R.), 68; Luther Kimmins (R.), 64; August Pastinger (D.), 23; Lewis Wharton (R.), 35; William Stevens (D.), 42; S. B. Chambers (D.), 28; G. F. Hartleb (D.), 35; Dr. H. P. Chambers (D.), 30.

Triadelphia's Charter.

The charter election at Triadelphia was somewhat quiet, only forty-eight votes being cast. The old council was re-elected, as follows: Dr. John T. Carter, John Weiss, John Helfenbine, August Ebeling, U. N. Hervey and Charles Herwig. As the old council granted license, this result shows a victory for the "wets," although the "dry's" put up a strong fight. The council elects the mayor, and it is supposed the present incumbent, Dr. Carter, will succeed himself.

Pleasant Valley Result.

The citizens of that pretty little town, Pleasant Valley, held their municipal election yesterday, and though the two top-notch offices went by acclamation, the councilmanic race was a hot one from the start to finish. Of five candidates for council, but five could enter that august body, hence considerable scratching was done.

Mr. J. R. Acker was re-elected mayor. Mr. Acker, by the way, is the only Democrat in the corporation. Mr. W. W. Gilchrist was also re-elected town clerk. The following was the vote polled:
