NEXT SUMMER!

Wheeling May Have a New B. & O. Passenger Station.

NOT SOONER, SAYS MR. GREENE.

General Manager of the Baltimore & Ohio Company—The Location Has Not Been Settled Definitely, but will be in the Near Future—The Main Street Site Talked of by Local People who Think They Know the Company's Plans.

So much has been said and written lately regarding the plans of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad management for the construction of the proposed new passenger station in Wheeling—an improvement that is needed—that the Intelligencer has asked General Manager W. M. Greene, of the company, to give the facts in the case. It had been said that the location was decided and plans in course of preparation so that work could be begun early the coming spring. The following from General Manager Greene shows that the passenger station will not be built in the spring:

Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, Office of the General Manager, Baltimore, Jan. 14, 1897.

City Editor, the Intelligencer:

DEAR SIR:—You favor of the 12th inst. received. As I have not settled definitely upon the location yet, and when we do, I shall be glad to give all the information I can. This will probably not be until some time next summer.

Gentlemen who have been close to the Baltimore & Ohio officials say there is little doubt but that the depot will be located at the corner of Main and South streets, thought the property would make it a very expensive site. On the other hand, there would be the advantage of having the freight and passenger stations near each other. It is said the experiment of having the temporary station on the South Side has not been beneficial to the local passenger business of the company; the traveling public of course, preferring a centrally located passenger station.

WILLIAM MYLES' FUNERAL

Yesterday Attended by a Large Concourse of Sorrowing Friends.

The funeral of the late William Myles occurred yesterday morning at 3 o'clock from his late residence, No. 2154 Main street, and was attended by a large concourse of sorrowing friends. Services were held at St. Joseph's cathedral, which was packed, not only with the members of the congregation of which the deceased was a prominent member, but with those of every denomination who were present to show the esteem they bore to their departed friend.

Rev. Father Harris celebrated requiem mass, and at the conclusion of the impressive ceremony, delivered an eloquent sermon upon the certainty of death, and concluded with the following eulogy upon the deceased: "Some of the highest positions amongst you fell within his reach, serving you well in various places of honor as a public servant. How well and faithfully he discharged his duty in each of them is better known to you than to me. He served your town well; he was a good member of your community, and his life is a living slap at those who would essay to state that a good Catholic cannot be a good citizen."

"To his church he was a loving and obedient child, filled with a deep abiding faith which he drank in with his mother's milk in that land of his birth. He was one of the earliest organizers of the St. Joseph's parish, and it is to him and his kind we owe the fact that we have a church to-day. He was ever docile to her teaching, ever faithful to her injunctions, and this silent altar rail, could it speak, would tell to-day how frequent a guest he was at the heavenly banquet of the eucharist. His charity was proverbial."

At the conclusion of the ceremonies in the cathedral, the remains were conveyed to Mt. Calvary, and followed by one of the largest funerals that has left the cathedral for years. The following were the pallbearers: Messrs. John Frew, James McGinley, Richard Donahue, Hugh Cleary, Patrick Wier and Peter P. Farrell.

A Large Funeral.

The funeral of John Ruckman, which took place at McMechen from his father's residence, was a very large one, showing the esteem in which he was held by his many friends. Religious services were held in the Disciples church and an appropriate discourse delivered by Rev. Bristor, who now has charge of the revival services in progress at the church. The young wife is prostrated with grief and she and her little child have the sympathy of their friends and relatives, of whom they have many, both in McMechen and this city.

FREE FOUR Y ARS

W. E. Chapin will have a chance to explain a transaction of 1893.

This afternoon, at 2 o'clock, Squire Rogers will hear the case of W. E. Chapin, charged with defrauding the C. F. Adams installment company. The case dates back to 1893, when Chapin was in the employ of the company, as a collector. Since that year he has been out of town, and Mr. J. A. Penn, the local manager of the company, hearing that Chapin was in Parkersburg, swore out a warrant before Squire Rogers, on January 12. Constable "Steve" Wilcox went down yesterday morning, and brought him up to the city last night.

Squire Rogers committed him to jail for his hearing in default of \$500 bond. The company claims that Chapin made false returns on his books, and used fictitious names, and pocketed the cash paid him by customers, which he failed to credit them with.

Finding that he was suspected of doing wrong, he skipped out in 1893, and now, after four years, he will be given a chance to defend himself against the charges preferred by his former employer.
