OLD JACK FROST,

He Has the Country in His Grip, and Wheeling's in It.

SUCH VERY CHILLY WEATHER

Has Not Been Experienced For Many Years—Some Figures Obtained From Observer Schenep—Navigation on the Ohio Suspended on Account of the Ice—All the Boats Except One Have Sought Winter Quarters—The Hudson Still Out.

Those mythical personages, Jack Frost, Old Boreas and fellows of their ilk are very much in evidence this week, and Wheeling has been favored by a flying visit. Such very cold weather has not been experienced in Wheeling in many years. But there's one consolation that is most comforting—the natural gas supply has proved adequate so far, and no cases of suffering from the intense cold have been reported.

The mercury in Schenep's thermometer began to do the grand tumbling act Sunday night and kept it up until 3 o'clock yesterday morning, when the lowest point was reached—4 degrees below zero, the lowest point registered here in many years. After 8 o'clock, when the sun cast his rays out of a clear sky, the temperature began to moderate, and in the afternoon was at the 12 mark.

Reports received from exposed neighborhoods in the vicinity of Wheeling, were to the effect that the mercury had descended as low as fourteen degrees below zero. Though it was probably colder in the country, yet the difference was not that great, and the reports brought in are explained probably by the faulty thermometers in use.

One of the results of the extreme cold weather has been the suspension of navigation on the Ohio river. Every steamboat plying out of Wheeling, with one exception, has gone to the bank. The exception is the Cincinnati and Pittsburgh liner, Hudson, which, when heard from yesterday morning, was at Middleport, Ohio, and struggling up the river. It is not anticipated that she will succeed in getting above Parkersburg, where she will probably seek shelter at the mouth of the Little Kanawha river. The ice may get so troublesome that she will turn back and occupy the snug lee harbor at the mouth of the Big Kanawha, to Point Pleasant.

The other packets are laid up at the following ports: Keynote State, Ben Hur and Kanawha at Parkersburg; Leroy and Lorena at Marietta, in the mouth of the Muskingum; Virginia at Cincinnati, where she will probably arrive this morning; H. K. Bedford on the docks at Parkersburg.

Keystone at Sistersville; Lexington at Bellair; Jewel at Clarksburg; Argand, passed down Saturday for the Kanawha, and is probably tied up at Point Pleasant.

The wharrior is in a pretty snug harbor, the ice having piled up around her bows so that she is not being hurt by the big ice floes that are now passing down stream. Captain Crookard has a number of big cables out so as to protect his boat in the event of a rise and rush of heavy ice.

Mr. Hare, of the Natural Gas Company of West Virginia, said that though there had been a tremendous increase in the amount of natural gas consumed in Wheeling yesterday, yet the company had been able to furnish plenty of gas, and the few complaints received at the office yesterday, were not caused by lack of supply. It is a matter for congratulation that the gas company has been able to face the present cold snap without leaving their customers "in the cold."
