## THE "WHEELING."

How Council's Turning Down of the Reappropriation

WAS RECEIVED BY CITIZENS.

Sentiment is that the Credit of the City is at Stake, and that the Money Should be Appropriated—If Council Does Not Reconsider, the Special Committee will Endeavor to Force the Appropriation of the Money Through the Courts.

The action of the second branch of the city council last night in turning down the resolution from the special committee on gunboat "Wheeling" for the re-appropriation of \$300 for the purchase of silver, china and glass service for the latest addition to the new American navy to which the name "Wheeling" has been given, will be received with some surprise by the public, particularly as the state legislature went out of its way to give the council power to appropriate the money.

The silver, glass and china ware have already been purchased by the special committee of citizens and councilmen named by the council that has just retired, the china from the Wheeling pottery, the glass from the Central works, both of this city. This was done after the late council had made the appropriation and before the application for an injunction was made by Cotts.

Now that the way was made clear for the council to re-appropriate the money, through the sanction of the legislature, the committee naturally expected that the city legislature would appropriate without opposition. The action of the second branch last night, therefore, came as a surprise.

After the resolution for the re-appropriation had been defeated on a tie vote in the second branch there was a movement on foot to have the matter re-considered on account of the absence from the council chamber of several members who were absent before at the meeting of the committee on committees, but this was cut off by the motion to adjourn which passed.

Mr. James P. Maxwell, one of the members of the special gunboat committee, when seen last night, said that unless council reconsiders the matter and appropriates the \$300, measures will be taken in the courts to compel council to pay the money, for the committee that made the expenditures was a creature of council and bought the ware under authority of council.

Citizens who heard of council's action last night, were loud in expressions of their disapproval, saying that the credit of the city is at stake and should not be sacrificed. It is probable the matter will come up again at the next meeting of council.
