THEY'RE OFF!

Elkins Cadets, Seventy Strong, Depart for Charleston.

THEIR SPECIAL TRAIN LEFT

At 7:30 O'clock Last Night—The Boys Were Accompanied by Fifty of Their Friends—Great Enthusiasm Prevailed When the Train Pulled Out for the Capital City—Charleston Will See the Finest Marching Club in the State.

Last night at 7:30 o'clock, the special train on the Ohio River railroad, provided for the transportation of the Elkins Cadets from Wheeling to Charleston, where they will be the feature in the inaugural parade this afternoon, pulled out and the boys were given a rousing send-off by the great crowd that surrounded the Pennsylvania passenger station.

The club goes nearly seventy strong, a much better showing than was anticipated. Of these, twenty-eight are in the excellent drum and bugle corps, which will open Charlestonians' eyes, and there were thirty-nine Cadets in line.

Nearly fifty friends of the club accompanied the Cadets, and will give them the glad hand this afternoon when they lead the line in today's great inaugural parade. That the boys will make the hit of the day at the Capital City goes without saying, for there is no other marching organization in the state that is in the same class. Tonight the natty uniformed Cadets will be prominent at the inaugural ball, and only the brilliantly uniformed governor's staff will outshine them in appearance.

The special train was in charge of Traveling Passenger Agent Ashley Smith, of the Ohio River company, who made the boys as comfortable as possible, extending to them the use of the best coaches on the road. The train was made up of two day coaches and a sleeper which was filled long before the train started. At midnight the special train had passed Parkersburg and it is expected it will reach the Capital City at 6 o'clock this morning, going by way of Huntington and the Chesapeake & Ohio, if the Kanawha & Michigan road is still closed to traffic, as was believed last night.
