## THE CRUEL WAR

For Afternoon and Evening Market in the Second Ward

### CAME TO AN END LAST NIGHT.

When Council Passed the Ordinance Championed by the Fifth Ward Members—Mr. Horkheimer's Amendment Extending the Closing Hours to 11 a. m. was Passed—The Vote in the Second Branch was Not all One-Sided.

A special meeting of the city council was held last night for the purpose of considering the market ordinance, championed by the members from the Fifth ward. There was not the difficulty of the night before in securing a quorum in the First branch and at 8 o'clock the roll was being called in both branches.

Then the special market ordinance, providing that evening market shall not be held in the Second ward, and that the morning market on Wednesday and Saturday mornings shall end at 10 o'clock, was introduced in the second branch and passed by a majority vote, as follows:

Aye—Bucey, Gartley, Knoke, McFadden, Meehan, Nesbitt, Paul, Travis, Watson, Chew; total, 10.

No—Arndt, Beckett, Berry, Bronstrop, Connelly, Fair, Kindeberger, Meyer; total, 8.

Then the ordinance was taken over to the first branch, where it was read by the clerk. At the conclusion of the first reading, Mr. Horkheimer, of the Second ward, objected and cited rule 20, of rules of council. The gentleman spoke in defense of his stand, but Mayor Butts in his usual laconic way, simply waved his hand to the clerk, saying:

"Proceed with the second reading." Mr. Horkheimer wasn't satisfied and inquired if the mayor had overruled his objection. The member from the second ward was informed he had made a good guess. After the usual formalities the ordinance was passed by the following vote:

Aye—Bachmann, Davison, Ebeling, Hazlett, Schmidt, Strobel, Weidbusch, Williams; total, 8.

No—Hazlett, Horkheimer, McKelvey; total, 2.

Mr. Horkheimer, however, did succeed in having the closing hour of the Second ward market extended from 10 a. m. to 11 a. m.

The ordinance was sent across the hall to the lower branch for action on the amendment. Mr. Ahl wanted to know if a majority support of the amendment meant that the ordinance had passed. The chair answered in the affirmative.

Mr. Kindeberger at this point said he had intended moving an amendment, making the closing hour noon. The chair said it was not too late to propose the amendment, whereupon it was offered by the member from the First ward, only to be knocked out to the tune of 12 to 9.

Then the Horkheimer amendment was taken up and the action of the first branch concurred in. At 8:50 p. m. council adjourned.
