Druggists' Annual Outing. The Wheeling Retail Druggists' Association will hold its annual outing at Wheeling Park to-morrow afternoon. A large attendance of the drug dispensers will doubtless be present, as the association's membership has been increased lately. It now taking in Moundsville, Benwood, McMechen, Belleair, Bridgeport and Martin's Ferry. Bowling will probably be the chief diversion and an enjoyable outing is confidently anticipated.

Two New Guards. Two more of the recently appointed guards at the state "pen" at Moundsville, will assume their duties to-day, making six new guards in all. It is not likely others will be put on for at least a month, as it is not thought wise to threaten the efficiency of the institution with too many inexperienced men at once. In all, there are twenty-six places to be filled with Republicans, and as the penitentiary is now overcrowded, two men in some instances occupying one cell, the proposed extension of the building will necessitate more guards.

New Engineering Firm. In another column appears the dissolution notice of the well-known engineering firm of Hoge & White. This was the result of the passage of the recent ordinance passed by council, requiring the city engineer, Mr. White, to devote his entire time and attention to the duties of his office. Mr. F. L. Hoge, whose reputation as a civil engineer, is not excelled by any in the city, will continue the business, having associated with him Mr. E. Randolph Hix, under the firm name of Hoge & Hix. Their office is located at No. 1400 Chapline street.

THE COUNTY BOARD

A Regular Monthly Meeting of the Commissioners was Held.

THE OPPOSING RAILWAY LINES

Out the Pike Figured in the Meeting, Each Company Presenting a Petition Asking for Right of Way—The Matter Referred to the Road and Bridge Committee—County Physicians Elected—Annual Appropriation Ordinance Passed.

The Ohio county board of commissioners met in monthly session yesterday morning, President McGregor in the chair. The most interesting matter up was petitions from the Wheeling & Elm Grove Railway Company and the newly organized Suburban Electric Railway Company, asking for rights of way along the pike between the city and Elm Grove. The matter was referred to the committee on roads and bridges, and will come up later, perhaps not until the city council has disposed definitely of the petitions and ordinances from the same companies now pending before that body.

Committee bills were ordered paid as follows: Court house and jail, \$1,232 52; Finance, 11 40; Poor house and farm, 581 20; Infirmary fund, \$21 04—1,723 89; Contingent fund, \$21 04—1,723 89; Roads and bridges, 645 62; Total, \$3,213 73.

The committee on court house and jail recommended that a telephone be placed in the residence of the president of the board, he to pay the cost thereof, and it was so ordered. Ex-Sheriff Franzheim returned county orders paid by him to the amount of \$4,522 55, and proper credit was ordered given. The accounts of the transportation agent for the year 1896 were examined and were pronounced correct.

The superintendent of the infirmary reported as follows: Cash receipts, \$5 50; total number of inmates, 109; white males, 72; white females, 23; colored females, 4. There was one birth during the month and two deaths. Mary M. Vance was elected nurse at the infirmary hospital, to fill a vacancy.

Attorney John J. Coniff addressed the board on the subject of drainage on the Wheeling and Ridge road, the present arrangement resulting in throwing water upon the farm of Mr. Fisher. The matter was referred to the road and bridge committee, the prosecuting attorney and the county engineer, for examination and report.

The committee on poor house and farm reported in the matter of clearing a portion of the infirmary farm, that the contract be let to Mr. Mitchell, in consideration of his having the use of the cleared land for four years from next October. The recommendation was adopted.

A certificate was granted Abigail Hays to enable him to apply for a license to practice law. State liquor licenses within the town of Fulton were granted as follows: Joseph A. Marshall, Albert Stahnke, M. Stein, Isaac Bogard, Jr., Henry Frohman and Dorothy Bunch.

The resignation of George W. Hervey as road surveyor of precinct No. 19, Richland district, was accepted and Henry Carter was elected to fill the vacancy.

The bond of W. A. McCoy, superintendent of the county infirmary, in \$1,000, with Daniel Maxwell as surety, was approved.

The petition of P. Kennedy and others, for a reduction of grades on the national road, by taking the tops off the rises and filling up the hollows, was referred to the road and bridge committee, with the understanding that the entire board would participate in the examination.

Mr. Fritz nominated Dr. Armbrecht for county physician, city district, and he was elected unanimously.

Mr. Burkett nominated Drs. Alexander and Carter for physicians at the infirmary and for Triadelphia district, and so much of Ritchie as lay without the city, and they were chosen.

For physician for Liberty and Richland districts, Mr. Glass nominated Dr. N. D. Jobs, and Mr. Faris nominated Dr. Epstein. Dr. Jobs was elected. On motion of Mr. Glass, Dr. Jobs was allowed \$50 for medicines.

The annual appropriation ordinance, as heretofore detailed, was then taken up and passed, with but a single amendment. On motion of Mr. Burkett, \$150 was taken from the appropriation for the National road and given to Ritchie district.

The petition of the Wheeling & Elm Grove Railway Company, for a right of way across the Peninsula, through the town of Fulton, along Centre street and thence over the national road to Elm Grove, by the general route heretofore set forth, was presented. The matter was referred to the committee on roads and bridges.

A petition was then presented from the Suburban Railway Company, accompanied by substantially the same map that was laid before council at its last meeting. It was likewise referred.
