The amateur violinist, Master George Greene, evidenced rare musical talent in one so young and received special commendation from the appreciative audience for his skillful handling of his bow.

The programme closed with the recitation "When Grandma was a Girl," introducing the "Grand Minuet," "Spinning Song" and "Home, Sweet Home." The minims had been metamorphosed into "grandmas" with old time costume and powdered hair, and their apt imitation of this dearly loved ancestor was the crowning effort of the evening.
