This is contrary to the ten-day limit decided on at Columbus, which it was thought the Benwood men, being union miners, would adhere to. A HIGHER RATE

Of Insurance in Wheeling is the Promise Made by the

LOCAL BOARD OF UNDERWRITERS

Unless the Fire Alarm System is Made Perfectly Operative, which the Board insists that it is Not at Present—Committee Representing Council and the Underwriters to Meet and Provide for the Placing of the System in Good Working Order.

Unless the council committee on fire department places the city fire alarm system in good running order, which the local and national boards of underwriters insist it is not at present, Wheeling people will have to submit to an increase all along the line in insurance rates. The council committee on fire department has received the following communication from the Wheeling board of underwriters:

To the Committee on Fire Department: GENTLEMEN:—It having come to the notice of the National Board of Fire Underwriters that the fire alarm system of the city of Wheeling is at present inoperative, and through that organization the local board of fire underwriters of Wheeling has been notified that unless this very important auxiliary of the department is immediately repaired and made efficient, a general advance in insurance rates will be demanded. Therefore, we respectfully request your committee to take action at once, through some capable electrician, and have the fire alarm system examined and placed in accurate working order.

At a meeting of the committee on fire department, the clerk was instructed to send the following reply to the underwriters, which he did yesterday:

WHEELING, Sept. 14.

To the Board of Underwriters of Wheeling:

GENTLEMEN:—Your communication of the 6th inst. addressed to the committee on fire department, was presented at a meeting held last evening. A consideration of the matter resulted in the adoption of a motion that a sub-committee of three be appointed to act with a committee appointed by the board of underwriters, to make arrangements by which a thorough test of our fire alarm system can be made. Messrs. W. M. Baird, William Nesbitt and H. A. Gartley were appointed to represent the committee on fire department.
