A NEW ORDINANCE

Proposed by the Wheeling & Elm Grove Railway.

THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

ARE TO MEET ON THURSDAY AND INSPECT THE NEW ROUTE, WHICH PROVIDES FOR A "LOOP" ON THE COUNTY DIVISION—THE REDISTRICTING ORDINANCE GOES THROUGH WITHOUT OPPOSITION—ROUTINE BUSINESS TRANSACTED.

The Ohio county board of commissioners met in regular monthly session yesterday. Mr. Hare's ordinance for redistricting the county went through without opposition. The Wheeling & Elm Grove Railway Company presented a new ordinance, making important changes in the right of way, and the commissioners will go over the proposed route in a body next Thursday afternoon.

The new ordinance, if adopted, will give the company the right to construct a "loop" from this city to Elm Grove. The tracks, after crossing the Fulton bridge, will follow the line of Center street, instead of the national road. They will leave Center street and go through the Thompson property along the line followed by the old horse car road, to a point about midway between the Thompson homestead and Stackyard hollow. Here the tracks will cross the national road to the present line, and there will be a double track to Seibert's. The present track near Thompson's will be moved closer to the hill, and no greater portion of the national road will be used than is now occupied. From Seibert's to the Park, there will be a double track along the middle of the road, and the company agrees to pave sixteen feet of the road with fire brick. At points where culverts cross the pike it will be paved the entire width of the road.

The controversy between the board and Sheriff H. C. Richards was reopened just before the body adjourned.

The matter was finally referred to the prosecuting attorney for an opinion.

The court house and jail committee presented bills amounting to \$230.98; finance committee, \$1,512.80; poor house and farm, \$885.24; contingent poor fund, \$1,372.20; roads and bridges, \$3,392.80.

The superintendent of the county infirmary reported inmates in that institution as follows: white males, 79; white females, 29; colored females, 4; total, 112.

Mr. Hare's ordinance changing district lines in the county, came up for consideration. It was adopted by a unanimous vote, without discussion.

Mr. Russell asked leave to withdraw the Wheeling & Elm Grove ordinance, presented to the board at a former meeting. Leave was granted, and he presented a new ordinance, changing the route at a number of points. The new ordinance was read a first time, and further consideration was postponed until the 14th inst., when a special meeting will be held for that purpose.

The pages of the circuit and criminal courts, Albert U. Emblem, Earl Barr and E. Bachmann, presented a petition asking that their wages be increased from \$1 to \$1.50 per day. The petition was endorsed by fifty attorneys of the county. A motion to grant the petition was defeated, and the matter was referred to the finance committee.

The report of S. E. Caldwell, superintendent of the second division of the Bethany, West Liberty and Wheeling pike, was presented and referred to the roads and bridges committee.

A. L. Schultz was elected as constable to fill the vacancy in Ritchie district.

A communication was read from Richard Robertson, clerk of the county court, calling attention to the necessity for more shelf room for books of record in the vaults of the county court. It was referred to court house and jail committee.

Mr. Robertson also stated that there was much complaint from attorneys and others concerning the almost illegible condition of the two index books, both direct and cross, from 1850 to 1872. He asked that they be copied; referred to finance committee.

The board proceeded to the election of supervisors of roads for the two years beginning January 1, 1898. It resulted as follows:

Mr. Glass nominated Elsie Steele as superintendent of the Stackyard hollow road, and he was elected.

For the first division of the Bethany pike, Scott Gordon was elected superintendent without opposition. For the second division Samuel E. Caldwell and William McKinley were nominated, and the former was elected.

Attention was called to the fact that several justices of the peace have not been provided with copies of the Code, and the discussion which followed brought out the fact that retiring justices declined to turn over their copies.

The board adjourned to meet next Thursday afternoon, to go over the proposed route of the Wheeling & Elm Grove road.
