THE RIVERSIDE MEN

Met at Benwood and Appointed a Committee to Meet

THE MANAGEMENT OF THE MILL

For the Purpose of Securing a Higher Rate of Wages in Tonnage Work Than the Company Has Announced—Eastern Ohio Coal Operators Sign the New Scale. A Meeting of the Wheeling District Miners and Operators to be Held To-day.

The Riverside tonnage men of the steel department, held a meeting at the Benwood city hall yesterday, to consider the proposed reduction which goes into effect April 15. The meeting was largely attended, and lasted about two hours. Nothing definite was done, except to refer the matter of obtaining a more favorable proposition to a committee, which is to confer with the management.

It is likely the men will accept a similar scale to that in effect at the Wheeling steel plant, if they can get it, and are hopeful of obtaining a compromise. Should the company insist on the scale offered, there are many of the men who advocate a strike, but it is expected some arrangement can be made which will prevent a strike. The reduction as has been stated, falls heavier on some of the men than on others, and ranges from ten to twenty per cent.

The First to Sign.

The Trol Mines at St. Clairsville Junction, and the Standard mines at McClansville, on the line of the Baltimore & Ohio, west of Bellaire, signed the new scale of wages which will begin work this morning. These are the first mines of eastern Ohio signing the new scale.

Belmont Central Meets.

The Belmont Central Trades and Labor Union held a short and interesting meeting at G. A. R. hall at Bellaire, yesterday afternoon. There was a large attendance of delegates. President Henry Kunkle called the meeting to order at half-past two o'clock and all the officers except Vice President Larkins, were in their usual places. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The credentials of Roy Elliott, August Herbytsky and C. Culbertson, of local union No. 151, of Iron Moulders, were received and the delegates obligated.

The organization committee reported that the printers of Bellaire had organized.

President Kunkle, according to a motion passed at the last meeting appointed C. H. Smith, T. L. Lewis, Bion Williams, G. W. Curtis and W. S. Morris as a committee to arrange a plan for the celebration of Labor Day. The committee will make its report at the first meeting in May.

The arbitration committee reported that it was still investigating the Cleveland bicycle matter. The secretary reported receipts of \$3 50 and expenses of \$3 85.

U. S. COURT TO OPEN

Its Spring Term in This City To-day. The Late Firing on Steamboats at Down River Towns May be Brought Before the Grand Jury.

United States Marshal John K. Thompson and Chief Clerk Berry L. Priddle, of the marshal's office, arrived in town from Parkersburg last night. Judge Jackson, Clerk DeHiker and other officials of the United States district court for West Virginia will arrive today and the spring term of the court in Wheeling will open.

It is not anticipated that the term will be one of any length. Among the matters that will probably come before the Federal grand jury is the firing on the steamboats at Moundsville and other down-river towns during the late flood. It is understood that the steamboatmen have combined to present this matter before the court here and urge its prosecution. It is said, further, that they have secured the names of a number of the men who fired at the boats. They have also alleged that the guns used were those of the Moundsville company of the West Virginia National Guard and some from the West Virginia penitentiary, but those who ought to know deny these statements.
