## WITHOUT ACTION

### The Fight on "The Clementine" License Application ENDED IN IT BEING REFERRED

TO COUNCIL WITHOUT RECOMMENDATION, BY THE COMMITTEE ON PETITIONS AND REMONSTRANCES — HENRY AND JOHN ROBRECHT, SR., APPLIED FOR A LICENSE AT THE ST. CHARLES, THE FORMER BEING SUCCESSFUL—A SPICY MEETING LAST NIGHT.

The saloons which have been popularly credited with not being the best conducted in the city, especially regarding their moral atmospheres, were given some consideration last night by the council committee on petitions and remonstrances, their applications for the renewal of their licenses being on the table, whence they were laid at a previous meeting. All were finally recommended favorably with one exception. The "Hotel Clementine" was transmitted to council without recommendation for or against. The clamor aroused against certain saloons was given due recognition, but no protests in any shape or form were received from those people supposed to be opposed to granting the licenses. The committee was therefore helpless to do other than pass on them favorably, stating, however, that they would vote to turn down any license which was opposed by neighbors living in the vicinity of the saloon, when the license comes up before council. It would appear that the people opposing the licenses do not care to protest before the proper body, or are not aware of the course they should pursue. Without protest, a license bids fair to be granted. The meeting lasted from 8 to 10:30 o'clock, and while it lasted the members had their hands full, trying to see through a cloud of puzzles, worrying even to a board of inquiry or a court of appeals. The members present were: Chairman Hazlett, and Messrs. Ahl, Bachmann, Paul, Williams, McLure, Kindleberger. The first application was that of McFadden & Smith, proprietors of "The Clementine," near the upper market house.

Hon. T. S. Riley, attorney for the neighbors who protest against the license, read several strong affidavits as to the persons who frequent the place, and general remarks pertaining to the saloon. Mr. Riley said that the license would be fought to the bitter end, and intimated that the courts might have to listen to a request for an injunction. Mr. McFadden was then summoned, the committee holding an executive session. Mr. McFadden denied the allegations made.

Captain Bennett, the next witness, said that last Saturday he followed three women and a man into the saloon, and promptly ordered the women out. In reply as to the ordinance covering the practice of prostitutes loitering in saloons, Captain Bennett stated that the ordinance was lame, and not sufficiently specific.

This concluded the testimony. The affidavits presented by Mr. Riley took considerable time to read, so that with the discussion nearly two hours were consumed on the "Clementine" application, which, eventually, was referred to council without recommendation. The affidavits will accompany the committee's report. The committee remembered the former occasion when it recommended the annulling of this license, and how council turned the committee down, hence didn't care to try it again. But the committee's sentiment was fairly well expressed by one member, who remarked that he didn't think they were appointed a body of judges. It was to hear petitions and remonstrances, and not to shoulder all the responsibility of final action.

The next middle was of a different and more elevating tone. John Robrecht and Henry Robrecht each applied for a license for the St. Charles Hotel. The license has been granted for fifteen years to Henry Robrecht, and the committee granted it to him again. The hotel property is now in dispute by Henry and John Robrecht, the latter being the former's father, and the courts will have to decide the proper owner. This view of it was taken by the committee after being subjected to learned disquisitions as to whom was the proper person.

For Henry Robrecht appeared Guy R. C. Allan, and Frank Robrecht appeared for his father, their attorney, William P. Hubbard, being unable to appear. As the discussion progressed, the legal knots increased, so with a sudden start one member advised a cessation of words, and a few minutes later was given the license. Then came another whirl at some Second and Fifth ward saloons. While their applications were granted, it must not be supposed that the committee granted them out of pure willingness of heart. There appeared no other course since there were no protests. The licenses in dispute, if so termed, were those applied for by Joseph Barum, William Sherry, Valentine Leybold, the "White Cloud" and Fleahamm Bros.

### THE COUNTRY CLUB.

"The Country Club" is now an assured success. The board of directors held a meeting at the office of W. P. Hubbard, where the new drawings for the club house and bids were received and accepted. The successful contractor was Chas. Eisnach, who said he could complete the building by the middle of June. Work has already commenced on the grounds and they will be put into shape while the building is being erected. Knowing the desire that of the new club house, the board of directors has arranged to exhibit them this evening between 8 and 10 o'clock at the rooms of the chamber of commerce in the Hub building. The ladies will be quite as welcome as the gentlemen and all can see what a commodious building has been arranged by the architects, Messrs. Franzhelm, Glessey & Paris. Interest in the club for a time lagged, but now that the board has taken action the members seem impatient to get into their delightful quarters.
