RARE FORTITUDE

Exhibited by Henry Powell, a Six-Year old Benwood boy,

WHO WAS ALMOST CUT TO PIECES

BY A STREET CAR YESTERDAY MORNING—HIS RECOVERY DESPAIRED OF, YET THE LITTLE FELLOW HAS NOT UTTERED ONE CRY OF PAIN AND HE CONTINUES CONSCIOUS—THE SECOND ACCIDENT OF THIS NATURE WITHIN TWO WEEKS.

Henry Powell, a six-year-old boy, was almost killed by a street car in North Benwood, yesterday morning about 9 o'clock. At a late hour last night, the attending physician, Dr. J. W. McDonald, said his recovery was questionable. The boy lives with his mother, Mrs. Edward Powell, near Whiteman's, in Upper Benwood, and he received his injuries a short distance away from his home.

He had been sent for a pail of water to a pump close by, and in returning caught hold of the rear end of a delivery wagon with one hand. He didn't notice a street car coming along, and when he let go of the wagon he walked across the next track in front of a car coming from an opposite direction. He was in front of the moving car so quick that none of the passengers noticed him.

The car fender caught the little fellow and dragged him until the motor-man could check the car. At first it was thought the boy was dead. The injuries he sustained were a severe scalp wound, the back part of his head being torn off, a compound fracture of his left arm, bruises to his back, and fracture of several of his ribs.

This is the second accident of a similar nature that has occurred in Benwood within two weeks. Several days ago the two-year-old child of Wylie Watkins was instantly killed by a street car. In both cases the motormen were entirely blameless. Benwood streets are pretty well covered with railway tracks, and the accidents, unfortunately, are likely to be repeated when children play on the streets.

The boy's father, Edward Powell, who has been separated from his wife for six years, called at the Intelligencer last night and stated that no blame could be attached to the motorman. He says that his son's chief injury is to his right lung, which was penetrated by a broken rib, while his back was scorched by the supply wire. Strangely, the little fellow did not lose consciousness, and exhibits rare pluck, not crying a particle over his painful injuries.
