

THE SECOND DAY

Of the Teachers' Institute Results in Increased Interest.

MUCH FRUITFUL DISCUSSION

ON THE VARIOUS TOPICS—PROF. THOMAS E. HODGES, OF THE STATE UNIVERSITY, AND PROF. DUNCAN, OF BRIDGEPORT, MAKE GOOD TALKS—186 TEACHERS ENROLLED—A DEBATE ON A TIMELY QUESTION AT THE ENTERTAINMENT LAST NIGHT.

The second day's sessions of the Marshall county teachers' institute at Benwood, yesterday, were marked with more interest and enthusiasm than distinguished the opening day, and the various topics on the programme elicited fruitful discussions. An entertaining and instructive programme has been prepared for to-day.

Prof. Thomas E. Hodges, of the state university, took part in yesterday's proceedings, and he made several rousing talks. Instructor Githens was materially assisted also by Prof. Duncan, of Bridgeport, so that while the institute seemed threatened at first with a dearth of instructors, it now has a goodly supply.

The morning session began at 10 o'clock. "Language Study" was the first target for lingual bombardment. The discussion was opened by James Ryan, and later taken up by Prof. Hodges, who made a splendid talk.

Prof. J. T. King upheld a compulsory school law, giving reasons and benefits to be derived from this law.

The morning session concluded with a talk on school affairs in general, by Prof. Jones, of Bellairs.

Language was taken up again in the afternoon. Prof. Githens spoke of the origin of the English language, the derivation of the words, and the composite hereditary elements of the English language.

Prof. Duncan's remarks on "Nature Study" were intensely interesting. Prof. Hodges gave another practical dissertation on the last topic, "A Teacher's Preparation." His remarks were well chosen, and he drew some apt illustrations.

Last night an entertainment was given in the M. E. church by the Benwood teachers. The feature was the debate on the question, "Resolved, That the United States should hold all territory seized in the Spanish-American war." The affirmative was taken by Hon. Josiah Sinclair and Prof. W. R. Gorby; the negative, by T. B. Weekly and Prof. C. E. Carrigan.

A literary and musical entertainment will be given again this evening. Visitors yesterday included J. Alex. Young, S. B. Blair and Miss Meta Roberts, of Moundsville, Miss Maude Curtis, of West Liberty, and Prof. F. H. Crago, of Wheeling, and Miss Olive Ross, of Nashville, Tenn.

There are 186 teachers enrolled in the institute.

The committee on resolutions appointed by Superintendent Wirt, consists of the following: W. R. Gorby, D. Bonar, S. Hicks, Lizzie Turner, Sarah Porter, Mrs. Elva Conner, Mary Halpine.

CRAZY COLORED MAN

Created a Commotion at the Race Track Yesterday—He was Arrested.

A colored man with a pitchfork in his hands and insanity in his eyes, was a feature not on the programme for the races at the state fair grounds yesterday afternoon. People flew out of the colored man's reach, and general commotion reigned supreme. Finally he was corralled in a stable and Lieutenant O. M. Supler did the rest.

The prisoner hails from Danville, Ky., and his name is Winston Welch. He has been employed in the stables at the race track. His insanity is due to a fall he received off a horse, and a plate in his head shows where his skull was cracked. He became very effusive and energetic when deposited in Squire Rogers' court, and the officer had to hold him for awhile. Squire Rogers, with all the wisdom of a board of strategy, humored the colored man, by playing off doctor. He felt the colored gentleman's pulse, looked at his tongue, and in true medical style soothed his turbulent feelings, so that Welch was led to the jail as meek as a lamb for his hearing to-day.
