## HIS SECOND TRIAL.

George Emblem Being Tried for the Hiener Robbery.

### THE ABSENCE OF DR. HEDGES

WHO IS SAID TO BE "AT THE FRONT" IN THE ARMY, CITED BY THE DEFENSE AS CAUSE FOR POSTPONEMENT, BUT THE MOTION WAS OVERRULED BY JUDGE HUGUS—OTHER MOTIONS BY COLONEL ARNETT ALSO OVERRULED.

Yesterday morning in the criminal court, Judge Hugus on the bench, the case of the state vs. George Emblem was put on trial before the following jury: Platoff Zane, C. H. Berry, W. Alfred Wilson, J. M. Ephlan, C. W. List, J. A. Woods, W. N. Creighton, J. B. Crawford, John M. Dauer, George M. Carroll and C. H. Collier.

The state is represented by Prosecuting Attorney W. C. Meyer, assisted by Congressman E. B. Dovener. Emblem's interests were cared for by Col. W. W. Arnett.

Emblem is charged with the theft of a lot of silverware from the home of William Hiener, on the South Side. At a former trial in the criminal court, Emblem was found guilty, but on an appeal to the circuit court, a writ of error was allowed and the result is the present second trial of the case.

For the defendant, Colonel Arnett asked that the trial be postponed until he could locate Dr. George P. Hedges, a relative of the prisoner, who is said to be a material witness in behalf of the defendant. All that could be learned of Hedges' whereabouts was that he enlisted in the army and is "at the front." The motion was overruled by the court.

Another demand of counsel for the defense was for the entire jury panel, which it was alleged had been cut down by several being excused at the time of the Reynolds trial. The request was disregarded, and then the defense entered another objection, which was that the trial should not proceed until Bert Emblem, a witness for the plaintiff, is produced. Young Emblem is a page of the circuit court who is now out of the city on his vacation, making it impossible to serve the summons. The objection was overruled, and the trial was proceeded with.

Among the state's witnesses examined in the afternoon, was Louis Hiener, who testified to having been robbed of certain silverware, some of which was in court and identified as the stolen property by the witness.

Miss Julia Flading, a sister of Mrs. Hiener, testified that she was calling on the latter on the evening of the robbery. She identified some of the silverware. Mr. Hiener left the house between 6 and 7 p. m., and she and Mrs. Hiener left between 7 and 8 p. m. It was after this hour when the robbery occurred.

George Rogers, a neighbor of George Emblem, saw the latter enter his cellar early in the morning, carrying a basket full of goods, and he caught a glimpse of silverware. Later he went through the cellar and found the silverware.

Charles Ruckman, another neighbor, searched the cellar in an effort to find a watch that had been stolen from him, and while there found the silverware.

The trial will be continued to-day and will likely last several days.

### EPIDEMIC RECALLED.

Henry Witherspoon, one of two men who imposed the small pox epidemic upon Wheeling, here again under circumstances Partly Similar.

About three years ago a colored man, worn and ill with a terrible disease, sat down on the pavement across Sixteenth street from the city building. He had come off the packet Keystone State at this point and, like another colored roustabout from the Hudson, was hunting for the marine hospital. This man from the Hudson, it will be remembered, brought to Wheeling the first case of small-pox that was responsible for the prolonged epidemic of that disease that followed here. This other man from the Keystone State brought the second case, and it was not until city building officials noticed him sitting on the sidewalk that he was taken care of and given medical attention. He shortly became violently sick with small-pox, but ultimately recovered. This man was Henry Witherspoon.

Yesterday Witherspoon figured in an incident that had features remarkably similar. He was found on the sidewalk in the rear of Steff's tin store, in a semi-dazed condition. He was taken to police headquarters and claimed that he was suffering from a fit. City Health Officer Jepson was called in and said Witherspoon was simply suffering from what is now happily an uncommon ailment—hunger. He was sent on his way rejoicing by the city building boys.

Since Witherspoon contributed to imposing upon Wheeling her worst and most costly epidemic, he has been in various parts of the country, living the nomadic existence that is common with men of his class. His misfortune did not end with the severe attack of small-pox he had here; about a year ago he fell under a Chesapeake & Ohio freight train at Huntington, in this state, and lost his left arm above the elbow. And now, he says, he is subject to fits. Poor fellow, he has indeed suffered a series of misfortunes.


