The resolution adopted in reference to found a Masonic home authorized an appropriation of \$2.000 to be placed in the hands or the treasurer. This sum will form the nucleus for the required sum. No further steps were taken in connection with the prodect. A resolution to abandon the annual banquet was defeated, but in its place a resolution was adopted which provides for setting aside out of the grand lodge's treasury a sum sufficient to pay the expense of the banquet.
