THE GRAND LODGE

Of Masons Concluded its Business at Last Night's Session.

THE MASONIC HOME PROJECT

INAUGURATED WITH A NUCLEUS APPROPRIATION OF \$2,000—MARTINSBURG CHOSEN FOR 1899 MEETING PLACE—MR. JOSEPH HALL, OF THIS CITY, ELECTED GRAND MASTER—COL. HUGH STERLING AND GOVERNOR ATKINSON RE-ELECTED TO THE SAME OFFICES.

The thirty-fourth annual communication of the grand lodge, A. F. & A. M., of West Virginia, closed this morning just after midnight. The subordinate lodges represented were probably greater in number than at any meeting since the grand lodge was organized in 1865, and it was distinguished by the lodge of sorrow held for the late O. S. Long, and for taking the preliminary steps toward erecting a home for aged and indigent Masons in this state.

The grand lodge assembled last night at 7:30 o'clock, and received the reports of the several committees, which had spent the day in formulating their reports. Aside from the consideration of these reports, officers were elected, and Martinsburg was chosen as the meeting place in 1899. The resolution adopted in reference to found a Masonic home authorized an appropriation of \$2,000 to be placed in the hands of the treasurer. This sum will form the nucleus for the required sum. No further steps were taken in connection with the project.

A resolution to abandon the annual banquet was defeated, but in its place a resolution was adopted which provides for setting aside out of the grand lodge's treasury a sum sufficient to pay the expenses of the banquet. The old custom of having the local lodges where the grand lodge meets pay for the banquet was considered too great a burden for most subordinate lodges. No banquet was held in Wheeling this year, because of the lodge of sorrow. The veneration and great love in which the late Odell S. Long was held by his brethren was testified by the memorial buttons worn, which contained his portrait.

According to the custom of graduation, Mr. Joseph Hall, of this city, who was a deputy grand master, was elected grand master. The election of officers resulted as follows:

HENRY DANNENBERG, SR., DEAD.

The Well Known South Side Citizen Passed Away Yesterday.

Yesterday morning, shortly after 5 o'clock, occurred the death of Henry Dannenberg, sr., at the family home, 3742 Eoff street, South Side, after an illness that has extended over a period of several months, his ailment being acute bronchitis. Death was not unexpected, his condition having been critical for four days.

Mr. Dannenberg was a prominent citizen of the South Side and his demise is the occasion of general regret among a large circle of friends and acquaintances. He was a native of Uster, Germany, born December 31, 1837. He came to America in 1853 and settled in Wheeling. He learned the butchers' trade and was engaged in that line of business at the outbreak of the Civil war, when he enlisted in Battery A, Second United States Light Artillery, and served three years. This battery was in the Army of the Potomac, and Mr. Dannenberg was in the battles of Antietam, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, and other great combats of the war.

In 1865 he was married to Miss Louisa Carl, of this city, and in the same year entered business for himself at 3635 Chapline street. In 1890 he retired being succeeded by his sons, Henry, jr., and Charles E. These sons and another, William, together with three married daughters, Mrs. August Munchmeyer, Mrs. George Meyer and Mrs. Stewart McDonald, survive him.

The funeral occurs to-morrow afternoon from the family home.

MAY END FATAALLY.

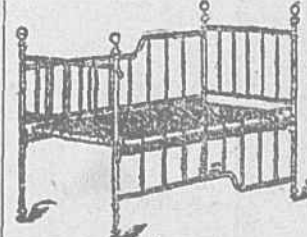
