MANDAMUS QUASHED

In the Matter of the Marshall County Recount and

A CERTIFICATE HAS BEEN ISSUED

TO MR. DAVIS, THE REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONER—SOME DEMOCRATS TALK OF FURTHER LEGAL PROCEEDINGS IN THEIR EFFORT TO SEAT THEIR CANDIDATE, MR. DUNLEVY—THE CASE HAS BEEN ATTRACTING MUCH INTEREST.

Judge Hervey yesterday favorably considered the motion to quash the mandamuses brought against the Marshall county court by J. W. Dunlevy, the defeated candidate for commissioner. This decision was rendered in the circuit court here, and after the motion to quash was sustained, Judge Hervey ordered that there be entered orders to that effect. This action was a victory for the county court, which later in the day, in view of its success in the circuit court at Wheeling, granted a certificate of election to S. R. Davis, the Republican candidate.

SOCIETY.

St. Luke's P. E. church, Island, was the scene of two pretty weddings yesterday, the principals being among the best-known of Wheeling's younger set, and both ceremonies attracted large gatherings. The Bailey-Laue nuptials were solemnized at high noon, the Anderson-Mager last evening. The church was elaborately decorated with flowers for both events.

The principals in the Bailey-Laue wedding were Mr. Lee Bailey, of the firm of E. S. Dinger Company, hatters, and formerly of the Bank of the Ohio Valley, and Miss Lida Laue, an estimable young lady of the Island. The ceremony took place at high noon, the officiating minister, Miss Anna Sage presided at the organ, and the ushers were Messrs. Harry Simpson, Charles Dittmar, William Laue, and John Laue. A large number of their friends witnessed their marriage and showered congratulations at the conclusion of the ceremony.

The bride entered the church accompanied by her father, preceded by the ushers, who were Professor W. B. Turner, Dr. W. C. Etzler and Messrs. Will F. Loeffler and Fred R. Sturges. There were no other attendants. The bride wore a white gown, trimmed with orange blossoms, and she carried roses. A reception occurred after the church ceremony, and at midnight the happy couple left for Eastern points of interest. They will go to Havana in a week or so. Mr. Anderson was one of Wheeling's young lawyers who became impressed with the opportunities Havana offered to investors at the close of the war, and he has been successful in his venture.

Michaels, who arrested Zane in this city last February, attended the trial, and yesterday complained of feeling sore after his horseback ride from Sistersville to Middlebourne and return, a distance of twelve miles each way.
