

MRS. BOOTH-TUCKER

Only Daughter of Salvation Army's Commander-in-Chief to

ADDRESS WHEELING AUDIENCE

At the Fourth Street M. E. Church Tomorrow Night—While Here she will be the Guest of Rev. Dr. J. L. Sooy—Her Topic is "The Social Work of the Salvation Army"—A Short Sketch of her World-Wide Work.

Captain John Newcomb, of Morgantown, has arrived in the city, and will conduct the meeting at the Salvation Army to-night. He is especially assisting in the preparations for the large and important meeting to be held in the Fourth Street M. E. church to-morrow night, at which Consul Booth-Tucker will preside, assisted by her talented private secretary, Lieutenant-Colonel Alice Lewis. Mrs. Booth-Tucker will speak on "The Social Work of the Salvation Army." Her meeting on Monday night at Allegheny was a great success, the Carnegie music hall being filled by an appreciative audience, who listened for over two hours to the consul's address. For the accommodation of the many in Bridgeport and Martin's Ferry who wish to attend the service, arrangements have been made for the cars to run until 11:30 p. m.

Mrs. Tucker is one of the forces of the Salvation Army. She is the second daughter of General Booth. In 1887 the consul was married to Commander Booth-Tucker, then in charge of the Salvation Army forces of India and Ceylon. For some time they lived in a little one-poled tent on the outskirts of the city of Bombay, and both there and in Gujerat, as also in Ceylon, in company with the commander, she begged from house to house as a religious mendicant, barefoot and wearing a "saree" of the old-gold color, recognized throughout Asia as that distinctive of the fakir class. The consul went to India twice, but on each occasion her health suffered so much that her visits could not be prolonged. The last time, indeed, she was hurried on board the steamer for Marseilles in such a condition that no one had any real hope that she would live even to reach Adep, the first port of call, and when she reached Marseilles she was still so weak that she had to be carried to her hotel in a kind of palanquin. After a brief stay in the south of France, she was able to proceed to England, and in 1894 she and the commander were called to London to take charge of the foreign office of the international headquarters.

Mrs. Booth-Tucker takes great interest in the social operations of the army, especially those which have for their object the benefit of women and girls, and the presence of five children in her own home makes her feel especially interested also in the welfare of the neglected children of our great communities. This has found its first expression in the establishment of a home for these in New York city, which will undoubtedly be the precursor of many more in other American cities.


