He will Endeavor to Regain his Liberty Through two PROCEEDINGS HE INSTITUTED

In the Circuit Court Yesterday—A

Writ of Prohibition Prevents the Sending of the Young Physician to the Weston Asylum as Contemplated—A Non-suit in the Turner-Hutchisson-Chapman Case.

Dr. S. K. Hissom, the young physician whose hearing on the charge of insanity was concluded on Tuesday by Justice C. S. Greer, will make every effort in the legal vocabulary to effect the recovery of his personal liberty.

Hissom's attorney, S. G. Smith, appeared before Judge Paull, of the circuit court, yesterday afternoon, and applied for a writ of habeas corpus, which was issued, and the hearing will be had this morning at 10 o'clock.
