Howard & Handlan, of Wheeling, were attorneys for the Reymann Brewing Company.  
 The Jefferson iron works, which will be offered for sale on Monday, at the front door of the court house, at 1 o'clock, by Receiver Wallace, will most likely meet with a sale, as several parties have been investigating the property and examining the works with a view to buying. We hope that it will get in good hands and operated to its full capacity. The Jefferson iron works is a part of Steubenville's history, and that of many of her most prominent families, and should not be allowed to perish.—Steubenville News.

## MASKED MEN

Brutally Assault and Rob two Ohio County Farmers.

CONSIDERABLE SUM OF MONEY  
 Taken from Henry and Fritz Pappa, who were Visited at Their Home on Short Creek, Near West Liberty, Last Night—One of the Brothers in a Critical Condition—The Gang Rode Away on Stolen Horses.

Intelligence reached the city last night of a terrible assault and robbery near West Liberty, in which the victims were two brothers, Henry and Fritz Pappa, who were visited at their home, on Short Creek, about three miles from West Liberty, between 7 and 8 o'clock, by a gang of masked men, who, after badly beating the brothers robbed them, and then rode away on horses, stolen from the Pappa home.

The affair created great excitement at West Liberty, whence the particulars were sent by telephone to police headquarters. It was stated that the Pappas had the reputation of keeping a considerable amount of money at their home, but how much money was taken couldn't be ascertained, as both brothers were beaten too badly to pay any attention to that detail. The gang wore masks, so that no member of it was recognized. The local police were asked to keep a look out for the thieves.

According to the story sent from West Liberty, the gang was three in number, for three horses, two browns and a black, were stolen, which leads to the belief that there were three men. It isn't known what route they took in leaving the Pappas put up a stubborn resistance when attacked, and the villains bound them, in addition to beating them. Then the gang plundered the house.

One of the brothers managed to release himself after the gang had gone, and making his way to a neighbor's he spread the alarm. The other brother hadn't fared so well, and it was stated that his injuries were so great that he had little chance of recovery. The affair created intense excitement last night in that part of the county, and the perpetrators of the outrage would have been roughly dealt with if they had been apprehended. The only description that could be given was that the fellows were of medium size, the masks excluding sight of their faces, but it is thought they were familiar with the surroundings.

It was learned that between \$500 and \$600 was secured by the robbers, who compelled Fritz Pappa to show them the place, where the money was concealed. Henry Pappa's injuries are serious; his nose was nearly severed and hangs down over his lips. The two Pappas and a boy were bound by ropes before the robbers left, but Fritz succeeded in releasing himself and aroused the neighborhood.

**Doe Gully Curves.**  
 About half way between Cumberland and Martinsburg, on the second division of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, is a picturesque spot known as Doe Gully. There is quite a little hill at this point that the road goes through, and the approaches to this tunnel include several reverse curves. The company has been engaged for the past two months in removing these curves and reducing the grades. The chief engineer says that the improvement will do away with one of the most objectionable pieces of track on the second division since Seven Curves were eliminated, and will remove four reverse curves. It will not only make a much better riding track for fast trains, but materially assist the west-bound freights in climbing this grade.

**Superintendent Harrison Resigns.**  
 W. H. Harrison, superintendent of motive power of the Ohio River railroad for twenty years, tendered his resignation on Saturday, to General Manager Underwood, on a tour of inspection here. He is sixty-seven years of age and has been forty-five years in the employ of the company. His action was purely voluntary and was a surprise even to the officers at Newark.
