The National Exchange bank of Wheeling, has declared its first quarterly dividend of one and one-half per cent. The checks will reach the stockholders this morning.

The enterprising firm of G. Mendel & Co. has just put into service one of the handsomest wagons ever seen in this city, and it is doubtful if a finer vehicle of its character is made.

Last night occurred the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Stierret Muldrew, wife of Mr. Andrew Muldrew, retired, of Sixteenth street. The funeral arrangements had not been made last night.

Warrants against parties suspected of stealing intelligencers from South Side subscribers were sworn out in Squire Dunning's court yesterday, and Constable Darby expects to serve them today.
