

HUMANE SOCIETY.

Board of Directors of the New State Institution met in Wheeling Monday Night and Organized—The Appropriations for the Four Districts. Monday evening, in the rooms of the chamber of commerce, the board of directors of the West Virginia Humane Society, the new state institution, which was legislated for largely through the influence of Mrs. John K. List, of this city, who spent some time at Charleston while the legislature was in session, met and organized.

The board is made up of a representative of each of the four congressional districts, as follows: First district, Mrs. John K. List, of Wheeling; Second district, Lee Lingamfelter, of Hedgeville; Third district, Mrs. Rose W. Straley, of Princeton; Fourth district, Holly G. Armstrong, of Jackson.

The board organized by electing the following officers: President—Mrs. John K. List, of Wheeling; Secretary—Lee Lingamfelter, of Hedgeville.

After adopting by-laws and regulations for the government of the board, the state appropriation voted to the support of the society by the legislature was appraised as follows:

First district	\$1,100
Second district	600
Third district	600
Fourth district	300
Total	\$2,600

The board mapped out plans for the prosecution of the work throughout the state, especially in the larger towns and in the mining regions. The board adjourned to meet in annual session at Charleston in October.

At the same time and place the local Humane society met in regular monthly session. The principal business transacted was the reception and approval of the report of Agent Echols. During the past seven weeks the agent had looked into over 100 cases, and the relief brought about in many of these showed how great is the good work the society is accomplishing in Wheeling and forms an encouragement to the state society in its larger field.

"SECOND" MUSTERED OUT.

Monday, and the Boys will be Home Before the End of the Week.

Yesterday, at Greenville, S. C., the Second West Virginia Volunteers were mustered out of the United States service, and it is said the Wheeling company, commanded by Captain Willis, will be home before the end of the week. It is not yet known whether the boys will come in a body so that their friends may give them a hearty welcome on their arrival. The following Associated Press dispatch gives the details of the muster-out:

GREENVILLE, S. C., April 10.—The last volunteer left Camp Wetherill today when the Second West Virginia, Colonel Casteel, was mustered out. The men celebrated at a lively rate, but no serious trouble occurred and the muster was without incident. Seven companies were taken home by the Seaboard Air Line and the rest by the Southern Railway on special trains which left this afternoon for various points in West Virginia.

THE INDUSTRIES.

President T. J. Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Association, was in the city yesterday. He met with the executive board of the second district, made up of Vice President James, of Martin's Ferry; Harry Evans, of Cambridge, Ohio; Walter Larkins, of Martin's Ferry, and M. F. Tighe, of Wheeling, for the purpose of re-classifying the No. 1 Aetna-Standard mill. Heretofore the men have been working by the day with the exception of the rollers, and the executive board yesterday decided to place the entire mill on a tonnage basis. No trouble is anticipated in effecting a settlement. In fact the board had a conference with General Manager Caldwell, which was satisfactory. He accepted the board's rulings with one or two minor exceptions that can be adjusted without trouble. Mr. Shaffer returned to Pittsburgh later in the day.

The Consolidation Effected.

Judge Doyle, of Toledo, attorney for the first mortgage stockholders of the Cleveland, Canton & Southern railway, states that the sale of the latter line to a syndicate of Cleveland capitalists, headed by Colonel Myron T. Herrick, has been confirmed, and that the reorganization of the Wheeling & Lake Erie with the Cleveland, Canton & Southern will take place early this week. He says that articles of incorporation for the new consolidation, or rather the reorganized Wheeling & Lake Erie, will be filed at Columbus before the week closes.

THE POPE LEO PICTURES

Witnessed for the First Time in Wheeling Last Evening.

The southern tour of the American Biograph Company opened at the Carroll Club auditorium last night. The pretty auditorium was comfortably filled with an audience made up of Wheeling's representative citizens. The exhibition given was the finest ever seen here, and the hearty applause that followed each picture was sufficient to show that the audience was satisfied.

The exhibition was given under the auspices of Lafayette Commandery, and St. Ann's Auxiliary, Knights of St. John. Their enterprise in this undertaking deserves the greatest success.

The entertainment is in three parts, the first being devoted to twelve very interesting views of the late war. The second is made up of comedy, railroad, fire and historic scenes, and the third is devoted to scenes of interest to the members of the Catholic church. The latter were taken in the Vatican gardens at Rome, and show Pope Leo XIII as he lives to-day. These were remarkable, and among the most enthusiastic admirers were the members of the clergy, of whom there were many present. Rev. Father Paquin voiced the sentiments of the others when he said the pictures were so life-like that one could imagine that he was in the presence of the venerable Pontiff. Rev. Father Moye also expressed his delight, as did Fathers McBride, Altmeyer, Stockes, Mullen, Molhearn, Wearl and others who were present.

This afternoon a matinee will be given, which the ladies of Mont de Chantal and the pupils of the Cathedral high school will attend in a body. The engagement will close here to-night and a pack of house should see it. Seats are on sale at House's music store.
