

CLIMATE AND CROP

Report of Department of Agriculture for West Virginia.

PARKERSBURG, April 18.—Following is the climatic and crop report for West Virginia for the week ending April 17: Generally clear weather, with mild temperatures from 11th to 15th instants, ranging over 70 degrees, prevailed until Saturday; then partly cloudy and much colder. Light, scattered showers fell on the 12th, 14th, 15th and 16th instants.

The week was unusually favorable for the rapid advancement of farm work of all kind; plowing for corn and oats progressed, and was nearing completion over a number of counties; oat seeding, potato planting and gardening were well advanced; early sown oats are making a good appearance. Wheat made a rapid growth, changing from a pale to a dark green color, and is in good condition; late sown wheat is improving, and giving a better promise.

Grass has made a fair start; meadows and pastures are in a better condition, but still short. Corn planting has commenced in Cabell county. Reports continue to indicate a slight touch, but an abundant apple yield. Stock is being turned out to pasture.

Wheat—Wheat and grass short, but look well; potatoes being planted and gardens made; plowing for corn and oats in progress.

Lewis—Wheat and grass doing well; oats mostly sown; plowing for corn and gardening being pushed; peaches killed, apples and cherries fair prospect; stock in fair condition.

Gilmer—Wheat and grass have made good growth; farmers plowing for corn and planting potatoes; gardens being made; cattle out on pasture, look well; apples will be a moderate crop.

Wood—Wheat looks well; meadows making fair growth, but short; oats and potatoes being planted, gardens being made; good prospect for apples, no peaches; roads drying up; stock only in fair condition.

Ritchie—Wheat making rapid growth; farmers busy seeding wheat, oats and potatoes, and making gardens; plowing nearly finished; stock looking well.

Pleasants—Wheat growing well; stock turned out, with pastures short; some corn plowing done and potatoes planted.

Doddridge—Wheat and grass have made good growth, but grass backward; plowing well advanced, oats mostly sown and potatoes about planted; stock looks well; peaches killed and a poor fruit prospect.

Harrison—Wheat in fine condition; grass still short; corn plowing about finished; oats being sown; apples promising; peaches killed.

Garrettsville—Wheat and grass growing fine; late sown wheat has been sown; potatoes being planted; plowing in progress for corn.

Tucker—Farmers busy sowing oats, and planting potatoes; wheat and grass made fine growth; oats nearly all sown; late sown wheat thickening up, and looking better.

Preston—Wheat in good condition; oats being sown.

Monongalia—Wheat and grass growing fast; farmers busy plowing and sowing; oats; potatoes mostly planted; stock looks well.

Ohio—Wheat and pastures growing and in good condition; oats being sown.

Brooke—Wheat and meadows growing well, and in good condition; plowing and seeding oats in progress; fruit damaged.
