"AL" FRANZHEIM

Returns Home From Cuba the Picture of Good Health.

HIS COMPANY MAY COME HOME

In a Body, and he Believes That Will be the Men's Decision When They Learn of the Movement to Give a Demonstration in Their Honor—The Fourth is to Take Part in the Peace Jubilee Parade at Washington.

Captain Albert A. Franzheim, commanding Company G in the Fourth United States volunteer infantry, familiarly known as the Fourth Immunes, came to town yesterday after having stopped at Steubenville to see Mrs. Franzheim. During the afternoon Captain Franzheim called at the city and county building and was greeted cordially by his many friends there and about town. He is bronzed by the semi-tropical climate out of which he has just emerged, and, like every member of his regiment, is afflicted with a slight cold caused by the sudden change to the colder weather of the states. Otherwise he looks his old self.

Captain Franzheim declined to be interviewed on the turn affairs in Cuba have taken since the departure of his regiment, but he said he did not believe the situation would grow into hostilities; on the contrary, he believed present difficulties would be dispelled in the near future and complete harmony between the Americans and Cubans restored.

He says his regiment has received orders from the war department to participate in the peace jubilee at Washington City to-morrow, and he considers this quite a compliment, as all the military organizations to participate are crack regiments. He left last night for Camp Meade and will be in command of Company G to-morrow.

Captain Franzheim says the regiment will be mustered out of the service on June 8 to 10, and the boys of Company G will be back in Wheeling before the 15th. He was asked in regard to the Intelligencer suggestion that the company be given a formal reception by the people of Wheeling, and he was enthusiastically in favor of such a demonstration provided the boys are willing to come back in a body. He added that some of his men talked of visiting in the east before returning home, but he thought when they learned of the proposed demonstration they would forego other pleasures for the greater one of being welcomed home by the people of their native town. The captain promised to place the matter before the men this week, and he will wire their determination, after which there will be an abundance of time during which to arrange for the demonstration.
