Yesterday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, on Fourteenth street between Chapline and Eoff, occurred the annual competitive drill participated in by the three companies of Linsly Institute Cadets, A, B and C. A large crowd was attracted by the function, and as usual the gentler sex was liberally represented.

Each company, beginning with A and ending with C, was put through the manual of arms and manoeuvres outlined for the occasion, in the presence of the Judges, who were Major H. B. Baguley, late surgeon of the First West Virginia Volunteer Infantry; Captain Albert A. Franzheim, late captain of Company G, Fourth United States Volunteer Infantry, "The Immunes," and Mr. T. Harvey Pollock, a graduate of old Linsly. The companies all showed high proficiency, more in fact than at any time in the career of Linsly Institute, and this is indeed a high compliment to Lieutenant B. C. Dent, U. S. N., the commandant of the cadets and military instructor at the institute, detailed for the service by the national government.

The Judges retired to the institute building after the contest had concluded, and they pondered long and deeply before they were enabled to come to a decision as to the relative proficiency of the three companies. Finally they returned, and their report was handed to Major Beall, commanding the battalion, who announced it as follows: First—Company C, Second—Company B, Third—Company A.

It was stated, coming from the judges, that the contest had been very close, and that the company having the smallest percentage had acquitted itself admirably.

Miss Daddridge, of the Island, a sister of Ensign John Daddridge, was then escorted into the street in front of where the successful company was stationed at "present arms," and in a few well chosen words, charmingly delivered, she presented to Captain "Joe" Paull the colors, the trophy won by his company, with feeling.

Then the two defeated companies heartily cheered their successful competitor, and with this exhibition of good feeling the affair came to its close.
