Remains at Seio.

The annual meeting of the trustees of Seio College was held at Seio Tuesday, nineteen members being present. The usual degrees were conferred on the graduates, and the degree of D. D. on Rev. C. B. Graham, of Wheeling, and Revs. C. M. Hallett and E. A. Jester. There were seventy-five graduates in all the departments. An informal vote was taken on the question of relocation of the college, which resulted as follows: Cadiz, 3 votes, Seio 10 votes, Cambridge 2 votes and New Philadelphia 3 votes. An executive committee was then elected, consisting of residents of Seio, with instructions to confer with the faculty and devise ways and means to continue the college work for the coming year. The people of Seio guaranteed the salary of the faculty for two years, and that room, rent and board would be the same as before the old boom. It is possible that the executive committee may deem it expedient to hold the fall session in New Philadelphia while making needed repairs in Seio.

MRS. THOMPSON

Burial of An Estimable Lady who Died in Paris on June 4.

OCCURS IN WHEELING FRIDAY.

The Deceased was a Member of the Well Known Moffett Family Prominent in the Old Dominion—Sketch of her Family and Distinguished Connections—Services Friday Morning at St. Matthew's P. E. Church.

Mrs. Mary E. Thompson, whose remains will arrive in Wheeling to-morrow direct from Paris, where she died June 4, will be buried at the Old Stone Church cemetery, after the funeral service at St. Matthew's at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning. Mrs. Thompson was born in Pocahontas, August 21, 1842, and was the daughter of Henry M. and Mary Vance Moffett, of Augusta county, Virginia, and was related to the prominent pioneer families of the upper Shenandoah valley, including the Prestons, McDowells, Stuarts, Millers, Lewises, Breckinridges, Warwicks and others whose names have figured conspicuously in the history of the Old Dominion. She was the great grand daughter of Colonel George Moffett, of Revolutionary fame, who had distinguished himself in the Indian wars preceding the Revolution, and was also first president Justice of Augusta county, and a member of the first board of trustees of Washington and Lee University, then called Liberty Hall Academy. He was a half brother of the late Governor Allen Trimble, of Ohio. Her maternal grandmother was a first cousin of Daniel Boone, the famous pioneer. On her mother's side she was related to the late Senator Vance, of North Carolina. She was married in May, 1861, at "Long Meadow" farm, in Augusta county, Virginia, to Colonel W. P. Thompson, who was then the colonel of a cavalry regiment in the Confederate service. After the war Colonel and Mrs. Thompson located in Parkersburg, where Colonel Thompson became associated with his brother-in-law, ex-Senator Camden, in the oil business, and became vice president of the Camden Consolidated Oil Company. After the Camden Consolidated was absorbed by the Standard Oil Company, Colonel Thompson removed to Cleveland, where he was associated with the Rockefellers, Paynes and others in oil refining, and was made vice president of the Standard Oil Company. Subsequently he was elected president of the National Lead Company, and removed to New York, where he died in February, 1897. At the time of his death he was also president of the Ohio River Railroad Company.

Mrs. Thompson leaves three children, all of whom are grown and married, as follows: Lewis S. Thompson, of New York; William P. Thompson, of Newport, and Mrs. Ralph J. Preston, of Colorado Springs. Of her own family the survivors are her only brother, Col. George H. Moffett, of Parkersburg; Mrs. Rachel E. McChesney, of Lewisburg, and Mrs. Martha Hall, of Barbours.

Mrs. Thompson's remains, accompanied by her sons and daughter, will arrive in Wheeling Friday morning at 10:30, over the Pennsylvania lines, and the funeral services will be held at St. Matthew's at 11 o'clock, conducted by the rector, Rev. N. S. Thomas, and assisted by Bishops Peterkin and Gibson. After the funeral the interment will be private at the cemetery of Old Stone Church out on the National pike, where she will repose by the side of her late husband.

The pall-bearers will be Messrs. J. N. Camden, G. A. Burt, H. C. Jackson, W. N. Chancellor, J. N. Camden, Jr., and B. D. Spillman, of Parkersburg; J. A. Moffett, of Chicago; Alexander McDonald, of Cincinnati, and W. P. Hubbard and George Baird, of Wheeling.

It was expected the body would arrive this morning, but there is a delay of one day on account of the failure of the steamship to reach New York at the time anticipated.
