MASKED MEN
Whose Object Was Robbery, Assault and an Aged Woman.
Mrs. Leonard Gockstetter, an aged resident of Boggs' run, was assaulted at her home Saturday morning by two masked robbers. The other members of the household were absent at the time, with the exception of her younger son, who becoming awakened from his sleep by the scuffle and his mother's screams, ran for assistance. The robbers were startled by his appearance and fled, leaving a revolver behind. They didn't get any money, although \$57 was locked in a drawer in the room.
Constable John Loy arrested Frank Wilson on suspicion, and she will appear against him to-day. Squire Lacey will conduct the hearing. The authorities will rely on Mrs. Gockstetter's identification in holding Wilson.

The Darby Case.
In this morning's police court will come up the case of Constable Frank C. Darby, charged with disorderly conduct and resisting an officer. The second charge has been preferred since Friday morning, when Mr. Darby was arraigned on the charge of scuffling on Chapline street with a woman, said to be Mary Scott. Mayor Sweeney then reserved his decision, as Constable Darby and Attorney Mahon set up the claim that Darby was in the act of arresting the woman when Officer Knabe happened along. The case presents some complicated features, involving a seeming clash between city and county officers. Knabe maintains that he didn't know Darby was a constable. It was erroneously stated the other day that it was Ed Darby who was implicated, but Ed resigned his office to enlist in the Fourth Immunes over a year ago.

THE REFUND
Some Objections to the Plan Withdrawn by Cincinnati Firm.
CHANGE OF TONE FROM LETTER
Sent by Rudolph Keybolte & Co. to City Receiver Forgy a Few Days Ago—Acknowledged Corrections as to Position Then Taken When Strictures on the City's Credit Were Pointedly by Raised—The Second Letter.

Saturday's Intelligencer told of the correspondence carried on by City Receiver Forgy with bankers throughout the country relative to the proposed refunding of the city's bonded indebtedness. Among the replies received was published that of Rudolph Keybolte & Co., of Cincinnati, which took some exceptions to the plan. Mr. Forgy thereupon set clear the point involved, and has received a second letter, which acknowledges the firm's mistaken impression. The letter follows:

CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 21, 1899.
Mr. A. H. Forgy, City Receiver, Wheeling, W. Va.:
Dear Sir:—We are in receipt of your esteemed favor of 19th instant, and fully appreciate your position and satisfactoriness of the conditions surrounding the city's debt, of which we were totally ignorant when we last wrote you, as, of course, we had nothing but your printed statement from which to draw conclusions. We note all your bonds are optional in ten years. If it is your intention only to refund optional bonds, we are thoroughly in accord with your procedure. We may have misunderstood your circular. We would further state that from your exposition of the situation, we can heartily commend the action of your city, and withdraw all our remarks which would possibly be considered intemperate and quality to your city's credit.
