A JOCKEY HURT.

"Jack" Quinn Seriously Injured on Fair Grounds Track.

AT BUTCHERS' PICNIC RACES.

A Colored Rider and his Mount Stumbled, and Quinn, on John McGannon's Horse, who Followed, was Thrown far Beyond the Pair—It was a bad Mix-up—It is not Thought Quinn is Fatally Injured.

There was but one accident to mar the complete success of the butchers' picnic on the state fair grounds yesterday afternoon, and that it did not result fatally was little short of miraculous. It occurred in the first heat of the half mile running race, and created considerable excitement on the grounds, resulting in a rumor throughout the city later that both victims were killed. The race had five starters. "Jack" Quinn had the mount on John McGannon's horse "Duckadoo." A colored man named Jones rode Glenbok and "Speedy" Shannon piloted Melvin Kemp. The other horses were not involved in a mix-up that ensued. When rounding the upper turn, Glenbok was "cut down" by Melvin Kemp, so the jockey of the former horse asserts, and "Duckadoo," who was close behind the pair, fell over the prostrate horse and rider, pinning Quinn to the ground. The two horses scrambled to their feet, and the limp forms of Jones and Quinn were carried from the track. The former soon regained consciousness, and showed no serious effects of his fall, but it was feared Quinn was fatally injured. The city ambulance was summoned, and he was removed to the home of Mr. McGannon, in the East End. Dr. W. R. Taylor attended the injured man, but the extent of his injuries will not be definitely known before this morning. It is likely he suffered internal injuries. Quinn is a native of California, and has no relatives in this state. Shannon, the rider of Melvin Kemp, denies that he was the cause of the accident, claiming that he was four lengths ahead of the two horses; therefore could not have knocked Glenbok down. The two animals were badly injured, and their racing days are about over for this season. The race was one of the most exciting ever participated in by local horsemen.

The admission remains the same; ladies and children ten cents.
