THE LINES CHANGED Two Slight Changes in District Lines were Made by THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

At Their Meeting Yesterday Morning. The Central of a City School House Inspired Movement for one of the Changes--The Wheeling & Elm Grove Double Track Ordinance Postponed--Routine Business.

The board of county commissioners met yesterday morning in regular monthly session. Most important among the matters considered was the ordinance changing district lines between Richland and Triadelphia and between Union and Clay. The following bills were ordered paid: Court house and jail, \$1,633 44; Finance, \$1,738 95; Poor house and farm, \$25 11; Contingent fund, \$84 22; Roads and bridges, \$2,377 13. Total, \$8,429 57. Sheriff Richards reported county orders returned aggregating \$32,396 16, and as delinquent dog tax for 1898 \$110 was allowed by the board.

The superintendent of the county infirmary reported as follows: Cash receipts, \$2 69; inmates, white males, 77; white females, 23; colored males, 4; colored females, 4; total, 108. The ordinance giving to the Wheeling & Elm Grove Railway Company the right to construct and operate two tracks on the National pike from Pryor's hill into Elm Grove was laid over until a future meeting by general assent.

The bonds of Samuel Moran, a constable for Webster district, and of George Criswell, surveyor of road precinct No. 7 in Triadelphia district, were approved.

Two of the five sub-committees appointed at the last meeting to investigate the cases of people receiving aid from the county's poor fund made their reports, and as a result a few will be dropped from the list. The three other sub-committees have yet to report.

A petition was presented, asking the board to order a survey for a new county road from the Waddle and Warden's run road to the Bethany pike near Benjamin Spidel's place. The matter was referred to the committee on roads and bridges as a committee of viewers.

It was ordered that an ordinance be drawn, transferring from the contingent fund \$250 to make repairs made necessary by a recent slip on the North Fork of Short creek road. Commissioner McCurdy, of Triadelphia, reported that one of the road supervisors in his district had moved to Pennsylvania. David Jenkins was elected in his stead, the district being No. 4.

The board took up the ordinance changing district lines and it was passed. The first change it provides for is the moving northward of the Triadelphia-Richland line, so as to include in Triadelphia district a number of suburban residents who only recently learned that according to the lines of 1863 they are really in Richland. As all their interests are in Triadelphia they petitioned for the change, in which the board concurs. The other change is in the line between Clay and Union districts, and it merely swings the Clay school annex building back into Clay, where, of course, it belongs. Shortly after the building was built the board changed the Union-Clay line from Fifteenth to Fourteenth, thus placing the Clay annex in Union. The movement to have the change made was inspired by the effort of the Union district members of the city board of education to secure control of the Clay annex.
