**BRIEF MENTIONINGS.**

Events in and About the City Given in a Nutshell.

James Scott last evening pleaded guilty to assaulting James Marple, at Elm Grove, and was sentenced to ten days in jail and \$5 and costs, by Squire Fitzpatrick.

The top of the ventilator of the Wheeling Electrical Company's power house caught fire from a spark yesterday, which was extinguished with slight damage by the Eighth ward chemical.

William Parish, for jumping on trains, and William Henthorne, for drunkenness, were given ten days in jail yesterday by Squire Rogers, on complaint of W. M. Johnson, the "Pe-wiky's" special officer.

Rev. J. B. Starkey, of Minneapolis, Minn., the founder of Methodism in Colorado, will address the people at the North Street M. E. church this evening at 7:45 o'clock. Dr. Starkey always interests and instructs his hearers.

Squire Phillips yesterday continued until this afternoon the hearing of John Scott, Grace Davis and Clara Morris, the colored parties charged with stealing a trunk, and whose arrest at Steubenville was noted in Monday's Intelligencer.

The reunion of the Vaas family took place yesterday at Wheeling park. Eleven families were represented, consisting of children and grandchildren, forty-one persons. At the same time Mr. Henry Vaas celebrated his sixty-fourth birthday. A pleasant day was spent at the east-of-town resort.

Jacob Beck, an aged resident of the Eighth ward, sustained a painful accident yesterday. He was engaged in carrying an empty lard barrel down the stairs to the cellar in his son's grocery, and happened to fall. A nail in the barrel cut his wrist, the cut requiring thirteen stitches by Dr. Armbricht.

The county commissioners' committee on poor house and farm met yesterday and transacted routine business. There was to have been a special meeting of the board at Pleasant Valley to look into the matter of the Wheeling & Elm Grove Railway Company paying the pike from Pleasant Valley to the park, but the company agreed to do what the board desired, and the meeting was unnecessary.

## THE REFUNDERS

Meet Again To-night to Hear City Solicitor's Opinion.

### THE SOLICITOR HAS DECLINED

To State the Nature of his Opinion, but it is Predicted that in Will Interpret the State Law to Mean that Redemption Cannot Begin in Less Than ten Years—A Sinking Fund may be Provided for.

To-night the special committee of council having in charge the proposed refund of the city's bonded indebtedness, will hold another meeting at the city building. It will be remembered that when the committee adjourned last week it was to reassemble at the call of the chairman, Mayor Sweeney, and the understanding was that this call would be issued when City Solicitor Nesbitt indicated his readiness to give the committee an official opinion as to the time when the principal of the refund bonds could be paid off.

An Intelligencer reporter endeavored to secure from Solicitor Nesbitt a line on his opinion, but without success. Acting on instructions from the committee, the solicitor invoked the opinions of other competent legal authorities.

Notwithstanding the solicitor's declination to state the result of his investigation, the Intelligencer is in a position to predict that the opinion is in line with the solicitor's off-hand opinion, given at the last meeting of the committee—that the state law specifically states that bonds must be redeemed in not less than ten years and in not more than thirty-four years from their date of issue.

What effect this opinion will have on the campaign for a refund cannot be indicated now, but it would seem that the most likely solution will be a sinking fund, and to this plan there are indications of opposition in some quarters.

## "DELLA FOX"

**Attempts Suicide Early This Morning But Without Success—Sent a Twenty-two Calibre Bullet Into Her Neck.**

Between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning, "Della Fox," an inmate of Ella Miller's house of prostitution in Alley C, made an attempt at suicide, firing point blank into her neck with a twenty-two calibre revolver. The ball entered without striking the jugular, and it is not thought that the wound will prove serious. Dr. Ridgeway was called and dressed the wound.

The girl was with a companion, a young man from Benwood, and was driven to her room by the fellow's expressed intention to leave her. Officers Turner and Walker were called to the scene.

**To-morrow the Ice Man.**

To-morrow is ice men's day and the handlers of the frozen liquid will hold a picnic at Pleasant Valley park beginning at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and continuing until midnight. A grand street parade will precede the picnic, moving through the principal streets from Twenty-seventh street to Tenth at 1 o'clock p. m., headed by Meister's full band. The ice men will ride in carriages, and several artistic floats will be in line. At the park an ice men's contest is to take place at 6 p. m. Six contestants will make a one hundred yard run with a one hundred pound cake of ice, and the first one depositing his ice in the box to be arranged at the upper end of the park, will get the prize, \$50. Two colored men will ascertain which can sit on a cake of ice longest and the one who wins gets \$10. This contest will take place at 8 p. m. Dancing and bowling will form the other features.

**Wheeling Man Victimized.**

Says a special from Zanesville: Stephen Waterhouse, of Wheeling, W. Va., was in the room of ex-Mayor Rice, of Canton, Ohio, to-night, talking to the aspirant for gubernatorial honors, when some one "lifted" his pocketbook containing \$100. There was a large crowd of politicians in the room, and a sneak thief took advantage of the pushing and jostling to get the West Virginian's roll. He did not miss the money at once, and when he did all hope of finding the thief was practically gone.
