

WAR BORN STATE

Representatives in the G. A. R. Parade at Philadelphia

MADE A VERY PRONOUNCED HIT

Says ex-Department Commander Richard Robertson, who Returned from the City of Brotherly Love Yesterday—The Department Flag Carried by two War-Scarred Veterans who Were Wildly Cheered.

Most of the 200 G. A. R. veterans whom the "War Born State" of West Virginia sent to the national encampment of the order at Philadelphia, returned home yesterday, the Wheeling delegation arriving in the afternoon via the Baltimore & Ohio. All were enthusiastic in speaking of the breadth and cordiality of the welcome extended to the old soldiers by the good people of the City of Brotherly Love.

Ex-Department Commander Richard Robertson was seen by an Intelligencer man soon after his arrival home, and he re-echoed the sentiments expressed by the others.

"Our delegation of 200 West Virginians in the parade made a great hit all along the line of march," said Mr. Robertson. "In northern cities the people are always quick to appreciate the quality of patriotism that moved the men from any southern state to fight for the Union, and Philadelphia was no exception in our case. Our department flag, at our head, was carried by W. W. Deloe, now of Washington City, formerly of Wheeling, and Jake Honecker, Deloe hobbled along with surprising agility on one good leg, and Honecker, as you know, has an empty sleeve. The flag they carried and the limbs they didn't carry had a suggestiveness that stirred the thousands who witnessed the parade. At the rear of our line was the Custer cannon, long a feature at West Virginia G. A. R. meetings, which was fired at frequent intervals. When we came opposite the hillside on which several thousand school children were formed in shape of the letters "G. A. R.," the cannon was fired, and the boys and girls, though well trained, were unable to restrain themselves from breaking out into cheer after cheer. Our line was headed by the Parkersburg band, which we took to Philadelphia with us.

"The speech of General Warner, of Missouri, in placing General Rasselour, of the same state, in nomination for commander-in-chief, was the finest piece of oratory I ever listened to, and it would have brought about the election of Rasselour but for the fact that the big delegations, like Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio and others, had got together before the meeting, and slated Colonel Shaw for the office. In our own delegation we were all for Shaw before that speech, but when the ballot was taken all but one voted for Rasselour. I was that one, and I supported Shaw because I knew he would make an excellent commander. Next year I believe Rasselour will be successful.

"All in all, it was a very successful encampment, and we cannot say too much for the Philadelphians. During the war Philadelphia was known as the best place in the country, and she isn't retrograding now. There was no gouging of the visitors. Shaves continued at the same old ten cents, restaurants did not advance their prices—in fact there was a general disposition to favor the veterans. En route home thousands of the boys stopped over at Washington. When I was at the capital Saturday it looked as though a G. A. R. encampment were being held there."
