T. H. Reynolds, a former foreign representative of a newspaper syndicate, now interested in disposing of territorial rights for a patent soap, is in Wheeling on the latter mission.



THE RAILROADS.

There have been various stories written about the stealing of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad engines at Martinsburg, W. Va., during the rebellion and their transfer across the country for service on southern railroads.

Recently, an official of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad made some inquiries of old employes who were at Martinsburg at the time the incident happened, and they say that on June 19, 1861, 200 men of General Stonewall Jackson's command were detailed to destroy the Baltimore & Ohio's equipment at Martinsburg.

It has been currently reported in late years that one of the locomotives was the Winans camel-back No. 99, which at that time was numbered 77, but Col. Sharp did not care for this class of engines and took only ten wheel and passenger engines.
