

### METAL MARKET REVIEW.

No Important Changes Occurred in Prices This Week.

The market this week has been rather dull, but no important changes have occurred in prices, says the Ohio Valley Manufacturer. Some materials are a little lower than a week ago, but the general list is very strong, and there is little material being offered for early shipment.

Bessemer pig iron continues very firm at about \$23 50, but, as most of the furnaces are well sold up, there is little trading at present.

Muck bar is rather plentiful at present, owing to a great many of the eastern mills offering their product in this market; consequently price has dropped a little, and it is probable that \$22 would secure quite a little tonnage.

Mills, however, are well bought up for present wants and not disposed to buy ahead just now.

Skelp iron is a little weaker, principally shored sizes, and there is some anxiety on the part of makers to secure orders.

The situation in steel is practically unchanged; mills are all well sold up and are behind on their deliveries.

In the coke district the shortage of cars is still a very serious matter, and will probably continue so for thirty to sixty days.

Scrap materials continue to be scarce and consequently prices are very firm.
